THREE SAFE FROM WRECKED SCHOONER

(By Associated Press) KANATAK, Alaska, Jan. 12.—Three members of the gas boat Grizzly, wrecked November 15 on a barren islet in Jute Bay, seven miles from Kanatak, have arrived here safely after suffering terribly from cold and exhaustion during a nine-day enforced stay in their rock prison. During the period they were marooned the temperature dropped to 12 degrees below zero and the wind frequently attained a velocity of 80 miles an hour.

Each of the three carried ashore a blanket and a few cans of condensed soup. A stiff wind carried their boat away and the men found themselves marooned on a small island, half a mile from the mainland. For nine days they suffered untold hardships and were nearly complete exhaustion when a native exped them from the mainland and summoned help.

When brought here they were barely able to stand upright and their ears, noses and feet were partly frozen.

Kanatak is a new oil camp, located on Portage Bay, Alaskan Peninsula.
