COUNCIL PASSES NEW ORDINANCES

IMBLER, Jan. 13.—The city council of Imbler has recently been busily engaged in legislation. A number of new ordinances have been enacted; one with an emergency clause attached which makes it effective from the date of enactment, is entitled "An Ordinance to License, Tax and Regulate Dances and Dance Halls." Under this ordinance anyone wishing to give a dance must first procure a license from the city recorder, which will cost \$3.00. If any disorderly or vulgar dancing or use of intoxicating liquors are tolerated in the dance hall, the manager shall be deemed guilty of a violation of the ordinance and shall be fined not less than five and not more than a hundred dollars, or be imprisoned in the city jail for not less than one day and not more than fifty days or both be both fined and imprisoned at the discretion of the recorder. Those guilty of disorder are provided for in another ordinance, relating to public conduct. The city marshal will be present at each dance. Other ordinances relating to bootlegging and kindred topics have also been enacted.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE REPORTS

The report of the public health nurse, Meg Whittaker, for the month of December was made public today and is as follows:

General nursing service, 48 cases, of which 12 were social and 18 child welfare cases; 55 instructive and nursing calls were made and seven tubercular cases were attended to.
