

CLIFF DWELLINGS ARE DISCOVERED

Found in Place Believed in Past to Have Been Isolate of Human Habitation.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 16.—A group of ancient cliff dwellings, believed never before to have been visited by modern man, have been discovered in remote Parangweap canyon in Zion National Park in southern Utah. Parangweap is seven miles beyond the farthest point accessible by automobile and can be reached only on horseback or on foot.

Walter Rensch, acting superintendent of the park, tells of the ruins in a letter received here.

The group consists of five complete, cylinder-shaped two-story buildings, he said. The ceiling joists are made from round timber lying flatwise on top of the walls, with smaller limbs and twigs across the joists. The twigs are woven together at the ends with strings of yucca fibre. The walls are of flat stone imbedded in a red clay mortar.

These ruins are in close proximity to the cliffs, and they face south. Rensch attributes their remarkable state of preservation to their location, as dwellings in the immediate vicinity, more exposed to the elements, were entirely destroyed.

In clearing away rubbish in one of the buildings, Rensch found corn, beans, pieces of pottery and pieces of string made from the yucca fibre.

A minute examination of the newly-discovered ruins will be made during the coming spring. At present Zion National Park is closed for the winter and deep snow renders exploration impossible.

HAWAII'S MID-WINTER CARNIVAL SCHEDULED

HONOLULU, Jan. 16.—Hawaii's mid-winter carnival, famous in the days before the World War as the Mardi Gras of the Pacific, will be revived this season, according to a decision of the executive committee which was in charge of the event before it was discontinued in 1918.

The celebration, an echo of the old-time festivity staged in the days of royalty, will be held this season on one day only, February 25, but it is expected that next year will see the festival continue over several days.

A colorful program will be the chief feature of the February carnival as it has been in previous celebrations, when people came from all parts of the world to attend it.

FAMILY SPORT BATTLE CLOSE

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 16.—The Conroy family of Ogden and the Romney family of Salt Lake City, are having a merry battle for the family athletic supremacy of Utah. Both the Romneys appear to have a safe hold on the honors because there are more Romneys than Conroys.

Three Conroy boys have gained fame as football players and one is a college wrestler, while the five Romney brothers specialize in gridiron work.

Vincent Conroy, captain of the 1922 Navy eleven, is the most famous member of the Ogden family. Next comes Ted Conroy, who won intercollegiate wrestling honors at Cornell, and following him is Pete Conroy, who captained the 1922 Club Agricultural College football squad. Bringing up at the tail end is young Louis Conroy, who has been elected captain of the 1922 Ogden High School gridiron team.

Four of the Romney boys are now holding down positions as coaches after brilliant careers as football players and the fifth is just starting out on the gridiron.

G. Oliver Romney is football mentor at Montana State College; R. Lowell Romney coaches football at the Utah Agricultural College; Wilford Romney is football coach at the Logan (Utah) High School, and Milton Romney, who starred with the University of Chicago football squad of 1921, is gridiron coach at the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical college. Floyd, the youngest Romney, is a freshman at Montana State College and he plans to play football next fall, at least so he stated with the University of Utah team here.

The Romney family's claim of having furnished more football coaches than any other family in the United States has gone undisputed for some time.
