## WOOL GROWERS PROGRAM MADE

Plans Going Ahead for Annual Convention of the National Wool Growers' Association.

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 18.—The tentative program for the 60th-anniversary annual convention of the National Wool Growers' Association which will be held here from January 24 to 26 inclusive has been announced by F. H. Marshall, executive secretary of the association.

The convention will be opened January 24 at 10 a. m. with an address by E. J. Hagenbach, national president. The secretary's report and appointment of committees will follow.

Wednesday afternoon the program will include an address on "Stocks and Sheep Marketing" by Howe and M. Gove of the United States Packers and Stockyards Administration at Washington, D. C.

Thursday afternoon will be given by an address on "The Wool Situation" by M. Gove of the National Wool Warehouse and Storage Commission, Chicago.

Friday morning will be devoted to a discussion of the wool situation in the United States.

## BROCCOLIO SEED NETS BIG SUM

EUGENE, Jan. 18.—A fortune is in sight for the men who successfully raised broccolo seed in large quantities, according to local broccolo growers.

Broccolo seed is three times as valuable as an equal weight in silver, say the local producers. At \$22 a pound, the seed is worth \$5 an ounce.

Although the seed is expensive, it grows a fine crop. It is estimated that a pound of seed will produce enough to cover eight acres of ground.

## FEDERAL AID FOR UMATILLA RAPID SURVEY

Ten Thousands of Dollars of Federal Money May Be Had on a 50-50 Basis for Work.

PENDLETON, Jan. 18.—Further good news for the Umatilla rapid project and its supporters is contained in a letter just received from Congressman N. J. Simont.

The fact Mr. Simont seems anxious to have this procedure followed in order to survey the Umatilla rapid project indicates there may be doubt as to the passage of the \$50,000 recommended by the house committee.

Judge G. W. Phelps and other supporters of the Umatilla rapids project are now studying the question and making inquiries with a view to finding out how the prospective federal bill may be matched.
