COAL SUPPLY FOR THE PHILIPPINES RECOMMENDED
MANILA, P. I., Dec. 27. (By Mail)—The board of directors of the National Coal company in the annual report to the government which is the chief stockholder, recommends that a higher tariff on imported coal be imposed and that the additional revenue thus derived be used in paying a subsidy to companies now operating in the Philippines and for further development of coal fields in the island of Mindanao.

The report of the board says: "We do not believe it possible for any company, either government or private, to mine coal in the Philippines with commercial success unless the industry is given a protective tariff."

The report also declares that unless the coal properties can be leased to private parties, the National Coal company should cease operations and liquidation proceedings be inaugurated.

WOUNDED DOG NOW IS CATCHING RATS

(By Associated Press) TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 19.—A dog wounded in the World war and the holder of an honorable discharge from the United States army, is now catching rats at U. S. Veterans' Hospital No. 39 here.

The dog is Punksin, a fox terrier, and he is with his master, former Corporal W. H. Hall, who is recuperating at the hospital. Punksin saw service in the Marine, Aisne, Meuse-Argonne and St. Mihiel offensives and he is one of the few dogs if not the only one to possess an honorable discharge. His discharge papers, a proud possession of his owner, read:

"This is to certify that (71144) Punksin, Mascot Co. C. 27th Engineers, the United States Army, as a testimonial of honest and faithful service, is hereby honorably discharged from the military service of the United States of America, by expiration of term of service. W. D. Circular 106, Dec. 3, 1919.

"Said Punksin was born in Baltimore in the State of Maryland. When enlisted he was half year of age and by occupation a mascot. He had dark brown eyes, brindle hair, fair complexion and was one foot 2 inches in height.

"Given under my hand at Presidio, this 10th day of April, 1919. "W. A. Green, "2nd Lieutenant Engineers, U. S. A., commanding."

Where thickness of a Hair Equals a Mile
THE hair of a human head averages from two to three thousandths of an inch, and if motor service shop work is based on accuracy so coarse as a "hair's breadth," only poor results can be obtained.
Automobiles may be designed alike, and look the same, yet one, because of piston fits, has more power, speed and less vibration. When pistons and cylinder bores are held to limits of one thousandth plus or minus, it means that after a piston .001 under-size goes into a bore which is .001 over-size; and, in case of a three-inch piston, instead of having a wall clearance of .003 .001 for each inch of piston diameter) it has .005 and becomes an "oil-pumper"—an error of less than an average hair's breadth, yet, the results could have been no worse had it been a "mile."
Avoid errors as broad as a hair and for closely fitted pistons and perfectly ground cylinders have your repairmen bring your cylinder block to us for regrounding and piston assembling.
