ESCAPED MAN HUNTED DOWN

Dozen Officers and Two Bloodhounds Capture Andy Bushman After Twenty-hour Search.

PENDLETON, Jan. 19.—Andy Bushman, half-breed Indian, who last night escaped from St. Anthony's hospital, where he was held a prisoner, was captured today after a 20-hour hunt by more than a dozen officers and two bloodhounds. Bushman was paroled the day following Christmas from the Walla Walla penitentiary, and met Louis Inghelup, an escaped convict, who had stolen two guns. Special officer Anderson, who tried to arrest Inghelup, was covered by Bushman. Anderson fired and shattered Bushman's jaw. The wounded prisoner was taken to the hospital and tied to a bed. Last night Bushman sawed the chain and escaped. This morning a farmer reported that Bushman had demanded food. Bushman was seen at noon by Special Agent Bumbe of the railroad who gave chase. The convict was found by bloodhounds.

LEAGUE RAPS JUDGE LANDIS

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—William R. McCarthy, president of the Pacific Coast League, is home Thursday from Portland, Ore., scene of recent stormy sessions a result of McCarthy's casting a deciding vote to align the league against the draft, with a statement asserting that the official communications from the seat of war had not told "half the story."

McCarthy's statement denounced several of the league's directors for "trying to get" him and launched a tirade at Commissioner Landis for that gentleman's declared "inability to handle the Klipper case." Jack Lockhart, Los Angeles; Jack Crook, Salt Lake, and J. Hal Ewing, Crook, Ore., representing their respective clubs, held an executive session in Oakland prior to the Portland meeting, at which they laid plans whereby they "were going to get McCarthy," Mr. McCarthy charged.

After reviewing the situation of the major-league draft and the league's repudiation of the draft plan, Mr. McCarthy said: "What can be done now?" Then he answered his own question by saying: "Nothing." "They can appeal to Landis. What can Landis do? He has proven he is ineffective in his boasted power by being utterly unable to handle the Klipper case. Klipper is as much the head of the Portland club now as he ever was to all intents and purposes."

William Klipper, former president of the Portland club of the Pacific Coast League, was ousted from participating in any of the affairs of the league by Commissioner Landis some time ago.

NOT GUILTY SAYS JURY IN HERRIN CASE

A truck containing the convulsion workers was unbalanced on the road from Carbondale, under the same circumstances (June 21) and three of its occupants seriously injured, according to witnesses for the state after hardware stores in Herculano and Herculano had been looted of guns and ammunition. The same afternoon they testified, the auto was attacked by a crowd estimated at from a few hundred to more than a thousand persons. Defense witnesses, on the other hand, testified that the first shots fired during the afternoon came from the guards at the mine. Fighting continued during the afternoon with a number of airplanes, which were seen again the next morning, Herculano overhead. At about 5:30 p. m. the mine's defenders called a white flag after Col. Sam Hunter, a member of the adjutant general's staff from Springfield, had telephoned that he was testing to arrange a truce and that Lester had told him to tell them in the pit to surrender.

As the white flag was lowered and the shooting continued. At twelve the firing became brisk and the forty-eight men, remaining in the mine, many others having fled during the night, decided to surrender. After being assured of their safety, according to one witness, the men were marched out of the pit and twenty of them killed.

In evidence of its announced intention of proving acts of provocation and challenge, the defense introduced many other witnesses who testified to acts of aggression on the part of the armed guards at the mine. Some thirty witnesses testified that they had seen the travelers' lives taken, and that some of the defendants were present. Other witnesses asserted positively that all of the defendants were in other places at the time and so could have had no part in the killings.
