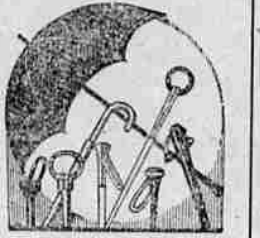

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Jan. 23. — Marshal Hart, thinking that John Evans had been killed by Harry Rhoades, held Rhoades at the city jail until Evans' boy applied for Rhoades' release. Evans and Rhoades teamed for a lumber company, had engaged in a fight over the care of horses. Rhoades felled Evans. It was thought the man was dead, and his body was removed on an improvised stretcher to his room in the Pythian building. He regained consciousness in about two hours and immediately sent word to officers not to hold Rhoades. Evans declared that he was partly to blame for the quarrel. The blow merely stunned the man.

MINE TUNNEL TO BEGIN SOON

Work on the Baisley-Elkhorn Mine Nearly Ready to Start Construction of Long Tunnel.

BAKER, Jan. 23. — To have opportunity to inspect the new camp that has been established at the Baisley-Elkhorn mine is to awake to the realization that here is a piece of real mine development being undertaken, like of which has never before been seen in Eastern Oregon, states the Baker Herald.

The work has been planned and laid out by P. J. Jennings, manager of the Delaware Mining company. Mr. Jennings has looked to everything for carrying on large operations and the making of the camp a permanent place. Every comfort of the men has been looked to in the buildings. Bunks, boarding and change houses are all steam heated electric lights, and modern in every particular.

The first of last June the camp site of the mine was a timbered mountain side and from this start the mountain has been graded for buildings, comfortable quarters built and with the arrival in a few days and installing of the remaining parts of the compressor plant, work will be started on the driving of the 6000 feet of double track tunnel which is the big development the company is undertaking.

FUR CATCH IS SATISFACTORY

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 23. — The catch of fur bearing animals in the wilds of western Washington is reported to be large this season despite several weeks of very cold weather during which the animals kept too closely at home to be trapped.

The largest catch thus far reported was made by Ingar and Theodor Olsen, brothers of Hoquiam, Wash., who trapped for two months in the Olympic mountains at an altitude of 5,000 feet. They caught 32 martens, two fisher and four coon, and they estimate their catch to be worth \$4,400 at present market prices.

FOUR L CONDITIONS IN EASTERN OREGON

In a recent issue of the Four L News Letter a report was given of conditions in the inland Empire. Of special interest to the citizens of this section of the state is the report of Eastern Oregon and Southern Idaho which is as follows:

General — Present market conditions are satisfactory and prospects for the future are assuring. Local lumber trade is somewhat above the average for this time of year. The car supply is fair, about 65 per cent of requirements being furnished.

Logging — Dry springlike weather is facilitating logging, which has been generally resumed following the holidays. The mills are being furnished their log requirements daily, but no great surplus is being accumulated.

Manufacturing — Practically all mills are running. Bowman-Hicks at La Grande is working a double shift to capacity. Grande Ronde at Ferry is still on a one-side, single-shift basis. The Baker mills are operating normally. Planer mill at Barber, Idaho, and both sawmill and planing mill at Emmett, Idaho, are running. Resumption of sawing at Barber is planned for February 1.

Employment — There is a plentiful supply of labor with all experienced local camp and millmen employed.

A crew of six men and a team of horses are busy today "getting down to bedrock" and although the plans for the building itself have not been completed, those backing the construction are unanimous in that they assure the public that "a building is going up."

SOVIET SUFFER FROM GRAFTING

MOSCOW, Dec. 23. (By Mail). — Definite steps to stamp out corruption and bribery, which has assumed alarming proportions in Soviet institutions and state trusts, as well as on railroads throughout Russia, have been taken by the council of labor and defense. Special commissions have been appointed to handle the investigations and prosecutions.

In Moscow recently some 400 railroad employees were arrested, and 133 of them were tried for the improper handling of railroad passenger tickets. An appeal has been issued to all citizens inviting them to give information regarding bribery and grafting, and assuring informers of secrecy and protection.

ZITA OF AUSTRIA MAY LIVE IN BAVARIA

BERLIN, Jan. 23. — Zita, former empress of Austria, has been visiting her mother, the Duchess of Parma, in Bavaria for the last two months and will probably remain with the duchess for several weeks longer.

Zita left her Spanish retreat in the Pyrenees, which had been placed at her disposal by the King of Spain, because of the excessive cost of keeping up the establishment. She has purchased an estate at Sarberg, near her mother's estate, on which it is understood she will erect a house. She has still a number of faithful retainers from among the Austrian nobility who act as her court officials.

CASE TO BE ARRANGED

MEDEFORD, Ore., Jan. 23. — J. W. Harrison of Fossil Creek, whose gun was accidentally discharged while on a deer hunting trip last Thursday, killing Ralph Teeple of Portland, will appear in justice court here tomorrow to answer a charge brought by Deputy Game Warden Daily of hunting deer out of season.

At the coroner's inquest Saturday, Harrison was acquitted of all blame for the death of Teeple, the jury declaring death accidental. Two other members of the fatal hunting party will also appear to answer to the same charge.

COLUMBIA SHERIFF GETS BUSY
ST. HELENS, Ore., Jan. 23. — Determined to put into effect immediately the policy of north-west sheriffs to wage more strenuous war on moonshiners, Sheriff Wellington of Columbia county, who returned yesterday at 3 o'clock from the Portland convention, arrested George Link of Goble and lodged him in jail before 5 o'clock the same afternoon. A 3-wagon still and a quantity of mash were found in the brush near Link's home.
