To Hot Lake—Miss Ruth Williams, who spent some time in La Grande visiting, returned to Hot Lake last evening, where she is employed.

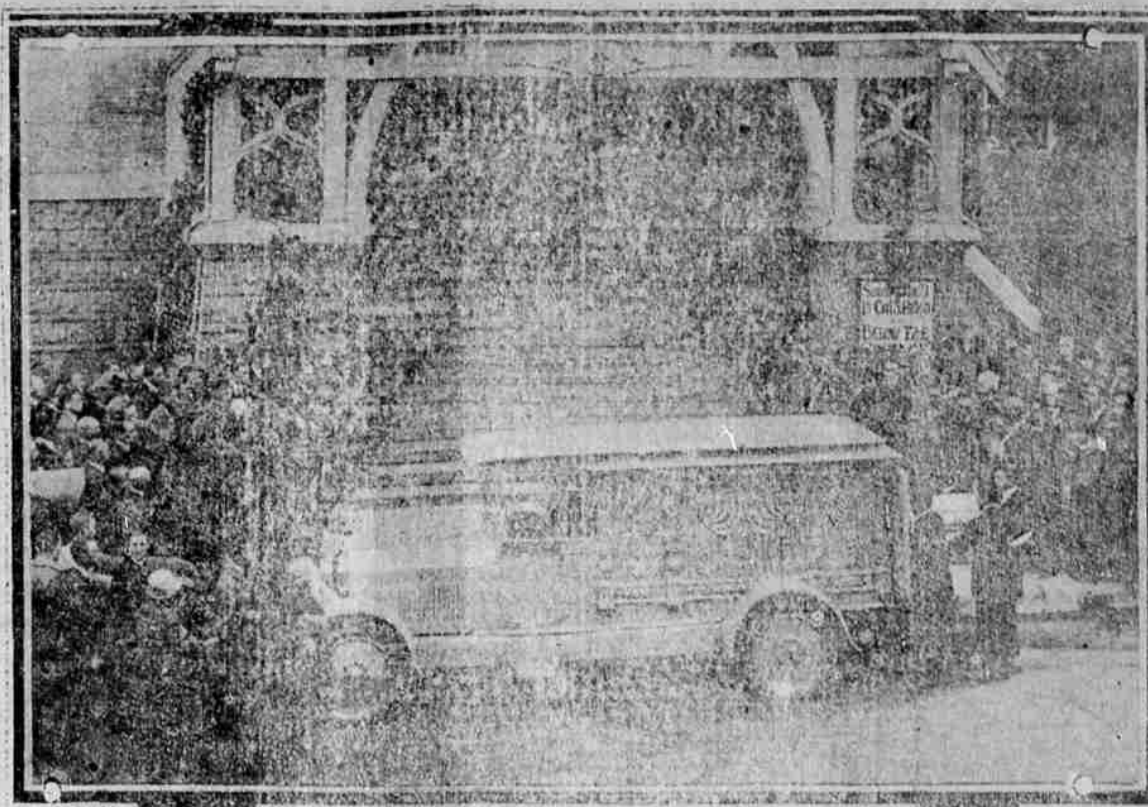

JUDGE EVANS NAMED HEAD CHILD FARM

The directors of the children's farm home of the W. C. T. U. held a most enthusiastic meeting recently in Corvallis for election of officers, hearing reports and making plans for the coming year. Fred A. Schmitt, who has served as president of the board since its organization, finding his college work so absorbing that he could not give the necessary time, refused re-election. Judge Walter H. Deane of Portland was unanimously elected president and is planning aggressive work. At the earnest solicitation of the board, Mr. Schmitt accepted the position of first vice president. Mr. W. K. Taylor of Corvallis was retained as second vice president, H. C. Severson of O. A. C. as secretary and H. H. Hirschberg as treasurer. With some reluctance, Mrs. Emma consented to continue as financial manager. New trustees elected on the board to fill vacancies were Mrs. H. B. Brundage, Portland; Mayor George L. Baker, Portland; and Mrs. C. P. Bishop, Salem, and an active campaign for funds is on, Portland and Salem having already organized.

A study of the mere money feature shows a conviction that to care for dependent children in the farm home at an expense to the state of \$14 per month for each child is cheaper than to send them to the state institutions where their expense of care averages \$35 per month. While to send the child out as an asset to the state rather than a liability is a matter of great moment.

WOOD APPLE IS MADE

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 24.—A duplicate of an apple from one of the oldest trees, it is said, has been carved from the wood of the tree itself, and is now owned by A. A. Quinberg of this city. The tree was planted in 1826 and is located on the Vancouver barracks, where it continues to thrive.

The seeds, it is claimed, were placed in the ground 96 years ago by an English army officer, stationed at the barracks, when Vancouver was in possession of the Hudson Bay company and under the British flag. His sweetheart in England sent him the seeds, and the tree is often called the "lover's apple tree."

Odd Musical Instrument

One of the most curious musical instruments ever made was the glass harmonica that Benjamin Franklin invented. It was composed of glass discs of different sizes set on a spindle and made by a treadle to revolve in a trough of water.
