CURWOOD'S NOVEL FINELY SCREENED

"The Valley of Silent Men" Was
Filmed in Canadian Rockies.

What Bret Harte was to the
Sierras, James Oliver Curwood is to
the Canadian Rockies. If he was not
their discoverer, he is at least, their
romancer. While acting as special
investigator for the Canadian govern-
ment, Mr. Curwood was charmed by
this unspoiled section of Nature's
wonderland, which he has made the
scene of so many of his stories—
"The Valley of Silent Men." That
title Eden of the North, over which
three snow-clad acme mountains
keep perpetual watch is no myth.
But with all his skill as a word-
painter Mr. Curwood could only in-
dicate the natural beauties of this
Northern Paradise. Even the "still"
camera and the painter's canvas can
capture only isolated bits of natural
beauty which seem so remote that
the spectator can hardly realize
their truth. But now the motion
pictures, those marvelous simulacra
of life and action, have followed Mr.
Curwood's trails, and in filming
"The Valley of Silent Men" amid the
very scenes which the author de-
scribed in his thrilling romance, will
bring home to millions of screen de-
votees the natural wonders of the
Canadian Rockies.

Cosmopolitan Productions on ac-
quiring the motion picture rights to
"The Valley of Silent Men," which
is running at the Arcade sent a com-
pany up into the mountains in the
early spring before the snows began
to melt. For 12 weeks they camped
and took pictures about Banff
and Lake Louise, and the camera
caught that miracle of Nature—the
coming of spring in the snowy wild-
erness. Chester Lyons, the camera-
man and Harry Wild, his assistant,
frequently took "shots" of fifteen
miles with the telephoto lens, and
owing to the clarity of the air the
visibility was wonderful.

SHERRY'S LAST DAY "BROTHERS UNDER THE SKIN"

A photoplay which fans should not
overlook came to the Sherry theatre
last night. It is a highly diverting
comedy of married life, with a sub-
stratum of drama, written by Peter
B. Kyne and produced by Goldwyn
Pictures Corporation under the able
direction of E. Mason Hopper, called
"Brothers Under the Skin."

The two men whose sub-cutaneous
brotherhood is made manifest in the
film are Craddock a humble ship-
ping clerk in a New York plumbing
business and Kirtland, the vice pre-
sident and manager of the firm. Both
are having trouble with their wives
and for very similar causes. Milly,
the shipping clerk's wife, believes in
sharing her husband's joys but not
his troubles. She lets him tiptoe
about getting his own breakfast so
as not to wake her from her "beau-
tiful sleep." She is a victim of the in-
stallation plan vice and buys more
things than her husband's \$30 a
week can pay for.

The vice president's wife, Dorothy,
must also have her beauty sleep in
the mornings while her husband
breakfasts and hurries off to busi-
ness. She brings him close to bank-
ruptcy by filling in a blank check
which she has cashed out of him by
buying a \$3,000 fur coat. The ship-
ping clerk is given \$5 to deliver a
note to Kirtland and while there
oversees a lesson in wife-taming
(given a happy ending by his hid-
den presence in the apartment) and
goes home to try the same even-
ing stuff on Milly. It works with
her just as it had with her wealthy
sister-under-the-skin and the two
husbands face a new life with help-
ing, loving wives who prove their
love by presenting their husbands
with children.

Director Hopper was given a mag-
nificent cast in the persons of Hel-
ge Chadwick and Pat O'Malley as
the poor couple, Claire Windsor and
Norman Kerry as the wealthy couple,
and Mae Marsh as a divorcee. They
give the picture a verve and verac-
ious vividness which puts "Brothers
Under the Skin" in the class of first-
rate screen entertainment which
fans should not miss.

Comedy, "Felix Wakes Up."

DURABLE HOMES NOW PLANNED

Report on House-Building is
Issued by Commerce De-
partment; Gives the New
Building Code.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Cheaper
and more durable homes for the
American people is the object of a
building code committee of the de-
partment of commerce. The commit-
tee was appointed by Secretary Hoover
to investigate building practices
and code requirements in the United
States and to propose standard build-
ing regulations based on the latest
and best information which might
be recommended to cities and states
adopting or revising building codes.

Secretary Hoover characterized the
report of the committee which deals
particularly with one and two-family
dwellings as "having value far be-
yond any similar work undertaken
at date."

The committee has recommended in
its report the minimum requirements
which it believes should be enforced
by cities in their building codes for
one and two-family houses and in an
appendix discusses good practice in
small house construction. The 100-
page printed report now made avail-
able at a nominal price to all in-
terested in better and more economi-
cal housing construction, by the de-
partment of commerce, not only pre-
sents a model ordinance which cities
may adopt but serves as a guide to
all those interested in showing where
to save and where to spend in order
to obtain a safe, substantial and dur-
able house at a minimum cost.

In a letter of acknowledgment ad-
dressed to Ira H. Woolson, chairman
of the building code committee, Sec-
retary Hoover states:

"I am confident that the generous
and voluntary contribution of time
and energy which you and your col-
leagues have given to this work will
result not only in a very appreciable
money saving to millions of Ameri-
can families, but that it will have
a positive influence toward better
housing that can not be counted in
dollars."

sandths of an inch, and if motor service shop work is based
on accuracy so coarse as a "hair's breadth," only poor results
can be obtained.

Automobiles may be designed alike, and look the same, yet
one, because of precise fits, has more power, speed and less vi-
bration. When pistons and cylinder bores are held to limits of
one thousandth plus or minus, it means that often a piston .001
undersize goes into a bore which is .001 oversize; and, in case
of a three-inch piston, instead of having a wall clearance of .003
.001 for each inch of piston diameter) it has .002 and becomes
in "full-pumper" an error of .002 less than an average hair's
breadth, yet, the results could have been no worse had it been
a "mile."

Avoid errors as broad as a hair and for closely fitted pistons
and perfectly ground cylinders have your repairmen bring your
cylinder block to us for regrounding and piston assembling.
