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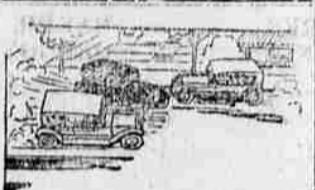

**CALIFORNIA COUNTY  
 FEARS RABID WOLVES**

(By The Associated Press)

ALTURAS, Calif., Jan. 27.—Another  
 scourge of rabid wolves is feared  
 for Modoc county and adjacent re-  
 gions. Several coyotes, made desper-  
 ate and fearless by the malady, have  
 been sighted at widely separated spots,  
 which prompts the belief that a gen-  
 eral spread of rabies will ensue.

About three years ago, rabid wolves  
 and coyotes became so numerous in  
 this county that people in the fields  
 and on the roads were in constant  
 jeopardy, and several persons were at-  
 tacked with fatal results. A coyote

in that condition does not hesitate to  
 enter a farm yard, or even a home,  
 and is regarded as a particularly dan-  
 gerous beast.
