HIGH SCHOOL EDITORS WILL GATHER SOON

Many Will Attend the High School Press Association and Student Body Officers' Meeting.

EUGENE, Jan. 29. (Special)—Between 150 and 200 high school students will attend the conference of the High School Press Association and the Association of High School Student Body Presidents and Secretaries to be held at the University of Oregon next Friday and Saturday, February 2 and 3.

Programs are designed to give the delegates general and technical instruction that will benefit them in their respective duties of editing and managing high school papers and annuals and conducting the affairs of student bodies. The delegates themselves give their fellow the benefit of their experiences in working out their individual problems.

Churchill to Speak—J. A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction, will make one of the principal addresses at a joint meeting of the association. Harry G. Johnson, Jefferson high school, Portland, is president of the Press Association, and Orlando Holm, Eugene, is head of the Association of Presidents and Secretaries.

Members of the faculty of the Oregon School of Journalism and others will give technical instruction. Besides presidents and secretaries of high school student bodies, the following will speak: C. A. Howard, superintendent of Marshfield schools; G. E. Finnerty, principal of Eugene high school; R. W. Tannner, principal of the Enterprise high school; Austin Landroth, principal of Pendleton high school; Earl Kipatrick, director of the University Extension Service, and others.
