SHELLEY IS ACQUITTED

(By Associated Press) HELENA, Mont., Jan. 31.—O. H. P. Shelley, Montana member of the Republican national committee, was today acquitted of the second trial of taking bribes from breweries and drug stores.

LEGION HELPS SICK VETERANS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 31.—Joe Sparks, chairman of the American Legion's national rehabilitation committee, has announced that the Knights of Columbus has set aside a fund of \$50,000, to be administered by the American Legion in the relief of thousands of tubercular ex-service men, who have migrated to the Southwest and who are at present in destitute circumstances.

The fund was authorized following a recent survey of conditions among tubercular veterans made by Claude J. Harris, director of the Legion's national service division, and William J. McGinley, supreme secretary of the Knights of Columbus. The Legion will provide finances to care for the veterans in the communities where the problem is the heaviest, according to Mr. Harris, who stated that the fund will relieve many ex-fighters who have developed tuberculosis since the war. A great many of these men are ineligible for compensation from the United States Veterans' Bureau because their disability has developed at a period later than two years from time of discharge, the Bureau time limit for compensation of pulmonary tuberculosis.

J. H. PARKER PASSES AWAY

BAKER, Jan. 31.—J. H. "Pink" Parker, vice-president of the First National bank, and a pioneer resident of Baker, passed away at University hospital, San Francisco, Cal., at 1:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon following an illness of about two weeks. His condition has been critical for several days past.

Born in Colwell county, Missouri, June 25, 1843, Parker arrived in Baker in the spring of 1871 and opened a tin shop. A few years later he became associated with Peter Pasche in the hardware business. Later he disposed of his interests to Mr. Pasche and on January 9, 1883, with Levi Ankeny, M. S. Burrell and D. P. Thompson incorporated the First National bank of Baker. Since that time he has devoted his entire time and attention to the institution which today stands as a monument to his energy and ability as a financier.

At the time of his death his wife and William Pollman of this city, were at his bedside. Mr. Pollman having been called to San Francisco on last Thursday. Besides his widow, Mr. Parker is survived by two brothers, R. T. Parker of Baker and Will W. Parker of San Francisco, Cal., and one sister, Mrs. Mary E. Hyde of this city. Funeral arrangements have not yet been announced, but it is believed that funeral services will be held in this city.

The serious illness culminating in the death of Mr. Parker yesterday has cast a gloom over his many friends and associates in Baker and Eastern Oregon and in his death Baker has lost one of its most substantial citizens and business men.

Mr. Parker was well known in La Grande and in addition to his many friends in Baker county, a host of La Grande citizens, who held Mr. Parker in high regard, mourn his passing.

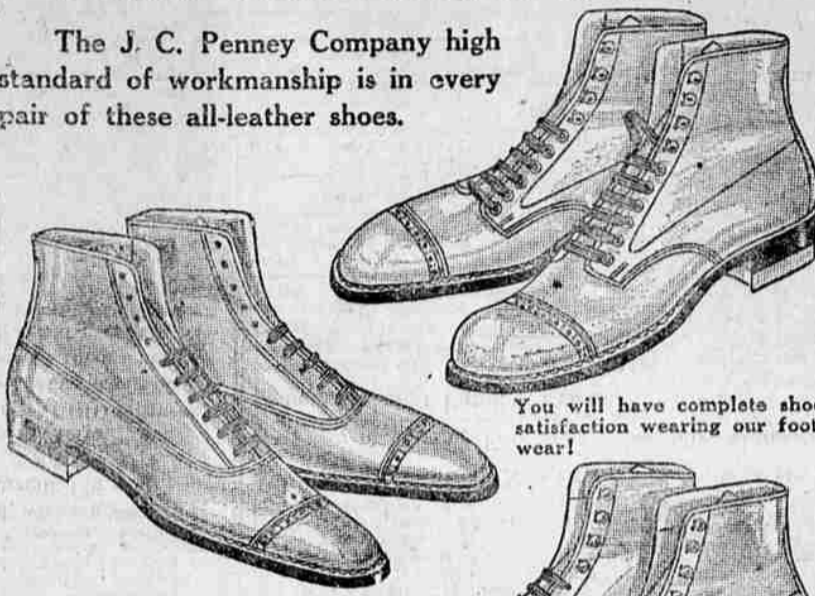

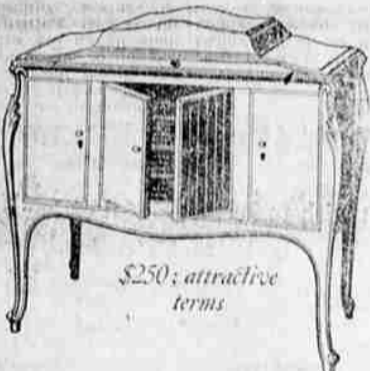
