COMMISSIONERS HOLD MEETING

Work on Civic Improvements Will Commence Soon; Island City-Adams Avenue Improvement Looms.

Plans to commence work immediately on the year's program of civic improvements were recommended to the city commissioners of La Grande last evening in their regular weekly session. All three commissioners were favorable to the recommendation and it is expected that the work will be started at the earliest possible date so as to insure a completion of the various projects during the summer season. Among those mentioned was the stretch of road connecting the Island City with Adams Avenue and while nothing definite was done on the matter it is to be expected that action will be taken at an early date to improve this section and with its improvement, one of the worst sections of roads in the vicinity of La Grande will become a myth living only in the minds of those who have used it in the past.

Several other minor matters were attended to at this time, among them being the granting of the city manager the authority to cooperate with the county in the repairing of the fair ground fence. It is understood that the "city pound" will be moved to the fair ground within a short time.

Authority was given the city manager to employ A. H. McLaughlin as assistant city manager for a short time to facilitate the completion of projects, the salary of Mr. Bellmer, in charge of the street cleaning department, was increased to \$5 per day and his employment was extended for another year. The firm of Maloney and Pierson presented a bid for the building of the city books and the bid was laid over until the time for opening bids arrived.

All three commissioners, President Sherman Williams, Dr. H. S. Brown and C. J. Black, were present and when Mr. Hayes, the new city manager, arrived shortly after the commission meeting began, they held a temporary recess and welcomed him to La Grande.

T. B. VICTIMS TO BE HELPED

Tubercular War Veterans of This District Will Benefit Greatly by New Federal Order.

Tubercular War Veterans of this district whose claims for compensation and hospitalization have been disallowed by the government will benefit greatly by a new federal order calling for extension of proof period following separation from service and the formation of a district tuberculosis board to consider service connection of cases after observation in the hospital, according to an announcement made by L. G. Joseph, northwest district manager of the United States Veterans' bureau. Hundreds of ex-service men of the Pacific northwest will be directly affected by this measure and every tuberculosis case will be automatically reopened for consideration. Development of tuberculosis from war service is increasing rapidly, it was stated.

The new instruction states that "active tuberculosis, minimal state, shown by competent proof as existing within 36 months from date of separation from active service, shall be considered as having been active and of 10 per cent degree within two years from discharge." The period of proof is extended three months in this instance and also to veterans suffering from tuberculosis, moderately advanced, who are allowed 24 months after discharge to show tuberculosis.
