ECONOMY CLUB PLANS PARTY

SALEM, Feb. 1.—The Oregon tax reduction league, at a meeting held here today, appointed a committee to draft by-laws and constitution for a new party to be launched in this state prior to the next primary election.

Members of the committee are Findley M. Edgar of Polk county and Dr. A. Slaughter, F. H. Van Trump and W. Jones of Salem. The committee will file its report at another meeting of the league to be held two weeks hence.

Members of the league declared that taxes had increased rapidly during the past few years, and that it was apparent that the old parties would not furnish the relief desired by the taxpayers. Because of this situation, it was decided to establish the new political organization and place a full state ticket in the field at the next primary election. The league has not yet determined on a name for the new party.

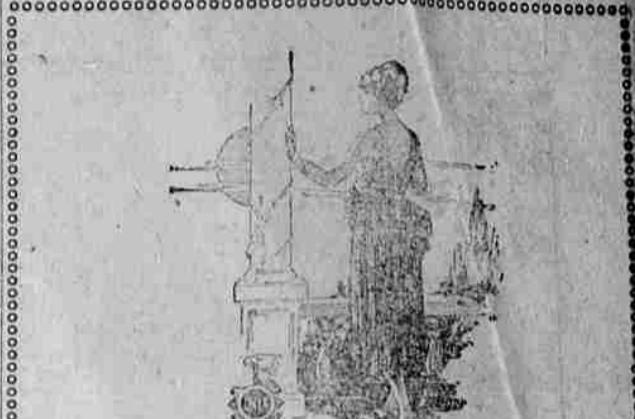
