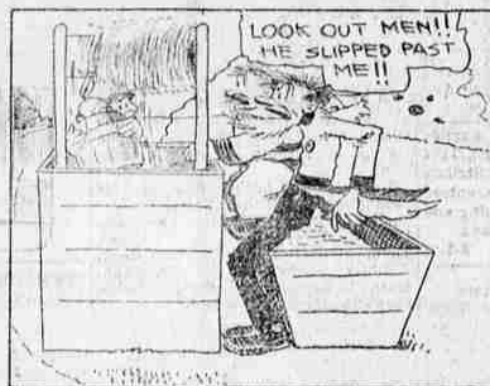
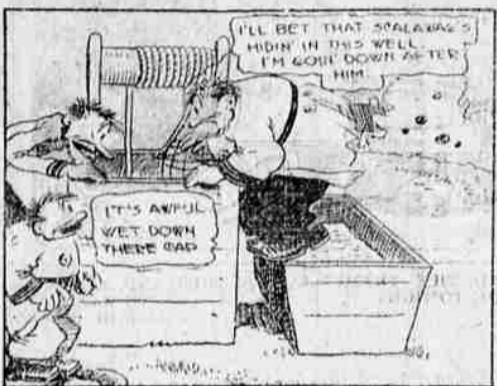
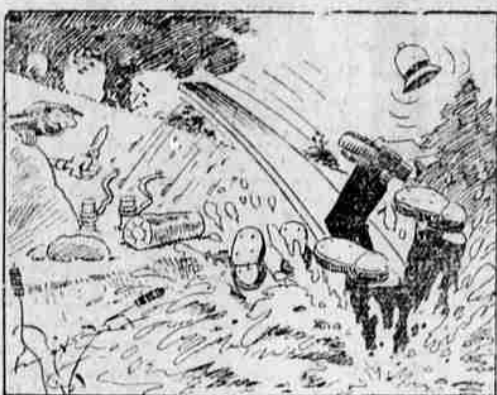

WOMEN'S LEAGUE INAUGURATES GIRLS' COLLEGE LOAN FUND

Instead of contributing to the Near East relief fund or establishing a fund for the organization itself, the women's league each year will set aside this money for the establishment of the loan fund. It is for use of all girls who need small loans to help pay their college expenses. Officers of the league have indicated they want women students to feel free to ask for loans, since it is for them that the fund is established. The fund will be available for use next term.

Railroads Plan to Eliminate Noises

A campaign to eliminate unnecessary noises around railroad terminals where passengers may be sleeping in trains is being waged by the Southern Pacific company in cooperation with the Pullman company.

At such terminals as San Francisco, Oakland Pier, Portland and Los Angeles, passenger trains are often made up and ready for occupancy in advance of their departure. This accommodation enables passengers to board sleeping cars and retire early in the evening if desired.

In order that passengers may not be disturbed, the railroad places signs near parked trains being occupied by sleeping passengers requesting railroad employes and the public to re-

train from all unnecessary noises.

"In placing these signs at our terminals," said Chas. S. Foe, passenger traffic manager for the Southern Pacific, "we are endeavoring to add to the comfort and convenience of our passengers. Everyone who travels can readily see the human side of such a request and we are well pleased with the results of the campaign."

Similar signs asking that quiet be maintained are being placed in all sleeping cars on Southern Pacific lines by the Pullman company. These signs are hung in the hallways and smoking rooms of Pullman sleeping cars after 10 o'clock at night.
