NOTICE TO WOOD HAULERS The following Rule for Measuring Pole Wood in Oregon is hereby promulgated by the Department of Weights and Measures and is now in effect.

Rules for Measuring Pole Wood on Wagon—The distance between the "Standards of a Standard Wagon is 31 feet. The bottom and top load added together is 7 feet. Subtract 7 feet from the circumference of the

load. The remainder is the sum of the sides of the load. (Height). Divide by 2 which will be one side. The expansion will then be 31 feet X one side X the length of poles which gives the number of cubic feet in load. 11 feet and 7 inches around the load by 16 feet in length being the required measure per cord. The poles should be uniform in length, viz:

11 ft. 7 in. minus 7 ft. equal 4 ft. 7 inches divided by 2 equals 2 feet 3 1/2 inches by 3 1/2 feet width by 16 feet length equals 128 cubic feet and 1-5 foot.

PONY EXPRESS RIDERS STAGE A COME-BACK

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 2.—The storied canyons of the old Powder River are to ring again to the hoof beats of the Pony Express rider. While the weather beaten Concord coach of the faded west will roll once more between the Missouri river and the Great Salt Lake in the celebration planned by the Mark Twain Memorial association of Nevada late this year to commemorate the western career of the great humorist, according to the celebration officials here.

It is hoped in some quarters to link the Mark Twain observance with the development of the work along the Victory Highway, the "Main Street of America," and the proposed Panama Isthmian canal, marking a jubilee celebration that would take in a vast territory from St. Joseph, Mo., to the Pacific ocean.

The old settler will, doubtless rub his eyes when he sees the Pony Express rider speeding once more along the benches of the Sweetwater famed Wyoming stream. It is planned to make his return merely a continued chapter of his past. Once more he will try to beat the sunset gun into Fort Laramie and the old plains outpost, Fort Bridger. These guns have been silent for decades. Although he will have to build no more willow roads along the brief deltas of the Carson river, he will hit the old trails of the Pite lands beyond the Carson, and the Cherokee and Sioux lands farther to the east and the north.

He will traverse the same old alkali wastes where his predecessors threw up a hasty fort against the encroaching redmen in the Sink of Carson. He will cross Sand Springs where another fort was raised. Further on he will see where the Cold Springs station of the Express was wiped out by the ever vigilant Pite enemy. Traversing the old trail across Wyoming, he will see where "Pony Bob" Haslam, one of the greatest of all the riders, made his memorable dash through Sioux and Cherokee infested lands as he gazed upon the bleaching bodies of thirty Chinamen that had fallen victim to the spear and the tomahawk.

However, he will not see the rider of the relay ahead murdered by the side of the trail, nor will he have to hunt for the still, stark body of the rider behind, as he had to do many times in the past. He will exchange greetings with his fellow rider going west, but there will be many more to greet him now. The automobile and the railroad cross the old trail at many points.

The Pony Express of the old days was intended to take off where the telegraph line ended at St. Joseph, and link the Far West, as far as was within its power to do so, with the busy wire. It continued for a number of years until Edward Creighton stretched his telegraph wire to Salt Lake City from St. Joseph in 1861, thereby winning a government bonus of \$40,000, and the California Telegraph company continued the line to San Francisco.

There were few and far between. The relays rode at the rate of 250 miles a day. President Buchanan's last message was brought from Missouri to Sacramento, more than 2,000 miles, in eight days, through all kinds of hazards, from thirty-foot snowdrifts to night stalling Pawnees. The relays were from 20 to 25 miles each, and the riders were paid from \$120 to \$125 per month, big money in those days. But the record shows they earned every cent of it.

Although the history of the Pony Express was relatively brief, it was marked by some stunning tragedies. There is the story of the Pyramid Lake massacre of Nevada, when Colonel Ormsby, famed old trail breaker, and seventy-five of his scouts were cut down by a band of sulking Putes.

There are other stories to the effect that frightened Argonauts, trundling in covered wagons, across the plains, mistook the fleet rider for a Sioux or a Piane scout on many occasions and shot him from his saddle. The turning of a stone hotel in course of construction in Virginia City into a fort while the Putes stormed it, and the saving of many women and children thereby, prevented what could easily have been a greater tragedy than Calaver's last stand for the slaughter of Pyramid Lake.

There is also the story of Jack Slade, keeper of the Pony Express station at Fort Kearney, who turned a "load" meeting a Frenchman named Jules, he decided that Jules had one too many ears. He tied Jules to a tree and proceeded to shoot off the offending ear. Then he decided that Jules was hopelessly disgraced, and he had his men finish the job. They left enough lead in Jules to sink a fair sized Whitehall boat.

Slade drifted up through the Blackfoot country, swinging his long barreled revolvers as he went, and finally met his fate at the end of a vigilante rope somewhere in the neighborhood of the Bitter Roots. The story closes not only with the lengthening of the telegraph, but also with the campaign against the Putes by Colonel Dan Hungerford, who drove what was left of the fighting elements of the Pite Nation into Mud Lake, with his 300 Texas Rangers and plains scouts flanking him. Colonel Hungerford afterward went to Italy and spent the remainder of his days at the home of a daughter, becoming almost as famous in Rome as in the Carson lands because of his romantic career.

DEBATE SUBJECT ANNOUNCED (By Associated Press) STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Feb. 2.—French foreign policy on the continent since the Treaty of Versailles, has been selected as the general topic for the Joffre debate, an annual contest between Stanford and the University of California debating teams. The date for the 1923 debate has been set, tentatively, for April 6. A gold medal is annually awarded by the Republic of France to the "most effective speaker" of either team.
