PENDLETON, Feb. 2.—One of the best boxing cards ever booked here is now tentatively drawn by George Singer, local promoter, to be staged Monday, February 19. If present plans are completed there will be at least 30 rounds of good boxing with some real class in the main event.

Frankie Dean of Pueblo, Colorado, who weighs in at 135 pounds but who goes 10 pounds out of his class to get fights, is booked to go ten rounds for the main event against Bede Mitchell of Portland, who is rated as a coming boxer at 145 pounds. The style of fighting of the two boys justifies the belief that this will be a real battle, according to Matchmaker Singer.

Carl Newquist, local mitman, who has featured here in several bouts, and who is now tipping the scales at 170, is matched against Pug Needham of Spokane who has been showing well in Walla Walla fights. This match would be the semi-final and go eight rounds.
