TODAY LAST DAY OF
"SHERLOCK HOLMES"

To millions of book readers and playgoers the detective story is the most thrilling and fascinating of novels or plays; to tens of millions of newspaper readers the latest developments of a big crime story are the liveliest and most irresistible of items. "TAILOR MADE MAN"
A HIT ON SCREEN
Charles Ray Immensely Pleasing in Screen Version of Comedy Drama.

The long-awaited screen version of "A Tailor Made Man" opened at the Sherry theatre yesterday and to say that it took with the crowds would be putting it lightly, for it is doubtful if any screen vehicle ever afforded Charles Ray so wide a scope for his sympathetic artistry. The audience all the time was in a state of sustained good humor, occasionally breaking forth in waves of laughter, and evinced a most lively interest in this screen story from the first flicker to the final fade out.

"A Tailor Made Man" is the first of Mr. Ray's super-features for United Artists, and deals with the philosophy and psychology of clothes, and never flirts off at any absurdly speculative tangent. Throughout, the humanization is adhered to; and in this field of humanness, moves the naive and daring John Paul Hart, altogether one of the most fascinating and lovable figures to reach the screen. Charles Ray's personation is intelligent and incisive, from the earliest scenes in "A Tailor Made Man" when he first designs out his plan of success, to the last (flicker-with) Tony in his arms.

Ethel Grandin is a sympathetic and delicate Tanya; Frank Butler a convincing abusive Jellcott; and Stanton Heck a dominant, rugged—Nathan Douglas Gerard, as the embittered, vindictive, colorful and vivid personification of Victor Foster, is an ideal grumbler, shallow-pated Peter; and Jacqueline Logan a graceful and clever Corinne. Others whose work stands out are Thomas Ricketts, Thomas Jefferson, Edith Chapman, Irene Lentz, Kate Lester, Nellie Peck, Saunders, Charlotte Pierce, and Eddie Griffith. The lesser roles seemed to be uniformly well acted, as well.

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 2.—Music has more practical value to the average college student than mathematics, according to Frederick K. Bolton, dean of the college of education at the University of Washington, in an address criticizing subjects taught in schools and colleges today. "How many of you ever had occasion to use a quadratic equation?" he asked. Every student should be taught some of the fundamentals of various subjects in short courses, Dean Bolton said, and then be permitted to follow his own inclination toward science, art, literature or the professions.

Latin and modern languages, as compulsory subjects, were also criticized by the educator.

NEW TYPE AIRPLANES
(By Associated Press)
SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 2.—New type airplanes with a mail carrying capacity of 1,000 pounds, more speed and added safety appliances are to be installed by the United States air mail service, according to announcement by Carlton Nelson, superintendent of the western division. Planes used at present carry only 500 pounds of mail. Increased appropriations by congress cover night flying in the west, Mr. Nelson said.

Where thickness of a Hair Equals a Mile
THE hair of a human head averages from two to three thousandths of an inch, and if motor service shop work is based on accuracy so coarse as a "hair's breadth," only poor results can be obtained.

Automobiles may be designed alike, and look the same, yet one, because of precise fits, has more power, speed and less vibration. When pistons and cylinder bores are held to limits of one thousandth plus or minus, it means that often a .001 under size goes into a bore which is .001 oversize, and, in case of a three-inch piston, instead of having a wall clearance of .001 for each inch of piston diameter, it has .005 and becomes an "oil-pumper"—an error of less than an average hair's breadth, yet the results could have been no worse had it been a "mile."

Avoid errors as broad as a hair and for closely fitted pistons and perfectly ground cylinders have your repairman bring your cylinder block to us for regrinding and piston assembling.
