The hillside farmers are doing a lot of good work on their road. Ernest Bell, J. E. Mills, Ben DeFord, L. McClain and a score of other men have put weeks of work hauling gravel and building a road where the road has been almost impassable.

The survey shows that 43 out of the 100 cases investigated have a bank account; 14 own their homes; 23 own automobiles; 25 have established their own business; 62 are married; 24 have government insurance averaging \$5,709.33 each and 35 have other forms of insurance. The average cost of training these disabled veterans to "carry on" in new occupations amounted to \$2,018.57.

One veteran who suffered a gunshot wound was rehabilitated as a surgeon and receives \$4,000 a year, a material increase over his pre-war earning capacity. SICK AT SEA NOW DOCTORED

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 2.—It used to be that anytime a sailor on a tramp freighter fell ill and his captain sent a wireless message to find out how to treat him, the story got Page One position in the newspapers. Nowadays these occurrences are so numerous that few are reported and only the outstanding ones find space in print.

One night recently the master of the steamer La Brea sent a radio message describing the symptoms of one of his men who was ill, received a reply, sent a report of the patient's progress and received instructions for an alternative treatment. The facilities for the measures first prescribed not being at hand, all within three hours.

The steps involved included reception of the message here, telephoning it to the office of the day at the Marine hospital where always there is someone on duty to tell ship captains what to do for suffering sailors, copying of the prescription dictated over the telephone, and the sending of that again to the La Brea. Altogether, about 200 words were transmitted, or approximately \$10 worth of work done, for tone of which was any charge made.

Radio stations on the Pacific Coast also handle free a large number of messages relating to derelicts and other matters to navigation, weather reports and other matters tending to make the lot of the mariner less fraught with hardship and suffering. This traffic averages four or five thousand words a month through some stations.

HEROIC ACT REMEMBERED

In glancing over a recent issue of the Oregon Journal in the column entitled, "Twenty Years Ago," the following article that may be remembered by older residents of Eastern Oregon was found. Date January 26, 1903. It reads: "Two lives were lost in a wreck due to a washout on Meacham creek on the O.W. R. & N. railroad yesterday morning. By remaining at his post Engineer Patty saved the lives of at least a score of passengers."

It will be remembered that Mr. Patty was employed as an engineer on the La Grande for about twenty years prior to his heroic death.

SWIMMING MEET CAUSES FURORE

HONOLULU, T. H., Feb. 2.—Assured triple competition and announcement of what are declared by officials to be the most elaborate plans ever prepared for a swimming meet in Hawaii, are creating unusual interest in the Washington meet, which is to be held in Honolulu, February 21-24, inclusive, under the auspices of the U. S. Army, with co-operation of the A. A. U.

Duke Kahanamoku, famed Hawaiian swimmer, has been invited to enter the competition.

The revised schedule provides for eighteen events for each of the two main evenings. Entrance of a strong navy team, in addition to the army and civilian entries, is now assured.

AUTO ACCIDENT TOLL IS HIGH

Six Hundred and Ninety-Nine People Killed in Nine Western Cities in Past Year.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 2.—Six hundred and ninety-nine persons were killed in automobile accidents in nine western cities in 1922, compared with 275 killed in the same manner in 1921, according to statistics compiled by the police departments in the various cities.

During 1922, a total of 13,895 persons were injured in automobile accidents in seven western cities, compared with 12,554 injured during the previous year in the same cities.

A total of 9,619 automobiles were stolen in eight western cities during 1922, compared with 8,787 in 1921, and 7,859 stolen during 1921 in the same cities.

Los Angeles, which held first place in 1921 and 1922 for deaths, accidents and thefts, passed ordinances prohibiting vehicles or animals to stand in tunnels, established safety zones at various points where street cars stop in the business district, and prohibited left hand turns at various downtown corner sections in an effort to prevent accidents. In 1922, Los Angeles plans to further restrict the buying and selling of second hand automobiles and parts, in an effort to stop stolen cars being transferred. The details of the new restrictions, the police say, have not been completed.

In Seattle, during the closing months of 1922, the police conducted a campaign against reckless driving and in many cases municipal judges imposed the maximum penalties prescribed by law. Frequent traffic conferences have been held, the traffic squad of the police department increased, and organizations throughout the city have been invited to co-operate with officers in curbing reckless driving and preventing accidents in 1923.

The Washington legislature is expected to take action during the present session upon a measure designed to prevent automobile thefts in connection with other states. The measure provides for the registration of automobile licenses and engine numbers and a checking system for tracing missing numbers.

Increase in the number of traffic deaths in San Francisco in 1922, compared with 1921, is proportional to the increase in population and use of automobiles, according to Harry Gleason, chief of the traffic bureau, San Francisco police department. Captain Gleason is a strong advocate of the enactment of laws which will require persons who drive an automobile to submit to a rigorous examination touching upon their qualifications in that regard before they are permitted to drive.

"The only way in which the matter of automobile accidents may be lessened is through a higher standard of driving," said Captain Gleason. "The driver of an automobile who is inexperienced is far more dangerous, according to my ideas, than an untrained engineer would be guiding a moving locomotive."

Sacramento, during the latter part of 1922, passed five ordinances designed to stop the use of automobiles and to regulate traffic. In substance, the ordinances increased the number of traffic policemen, organized under a captain, established a traffic regulation system embracing safety zones and lanes for pedestrians and restricted parking rules for automobiles in the business section.

Denver police attribute the decrease in violence from 1,774 in 1921, to 734 in 1922 to the end of the influx of unemployment at the close of the war, and the growth of the police auto theft squad. The Colorado legislature, in 1922, passed a law making the theft of an automobile a crime, punishable by prison sentence.

MODIFICATION OF VOLSTEAD ACT FAVORED

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 2.—The abolition of child labor, modification of the Volstead act and the passage of a motor vehicle bill were the program of Mrs. May Nelson, California first woman congresswoman, who was elected at a special election on Jan. 22, 1923, to succeed her late husband, John L. Nelson.

Congresswoman Nelson, in speaking of her views on child labor, said: "It was my husband's chief interest at the time of his death and it shall have a prominent place in my program."

"Naturally, I am going to carry out to the letter, insofar as I am able, my husband's ideas."

"Another bill which I shall try to carry to success is the minimum \$4 wage for government employees. This has always been backed by the South as it affects some 200,000 men, and the South rebels at the idea of giving the negro a \$4 per day wage. The South filibustered on the 23 minimum wage law at the last session of congress."

RATE FIXING RULE OPPOSED

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 2.—Repeal of the standard rule of fixing freight rates as provided by the federal transportation act and the restoration of state jurisdiction over state rates was recommended by a resolution passed at the closing session of the 62nd annual convention of the American Livestock association here Thursday.

The convention also went on record as opposing the amalgamation of all or any of the five large packing companies. It was asserted that such an amalgamation would reduce the number of buyers at each market and also reduce the number of branch houses and distributing agencies throughout the selling territories.

Other Resolutions Adopted. Among other resolutions adopted were: Asking an extension of two years of the limit provided in the tariff act of 1922 for the return of cattle shipped to Mexico for pasturage because of drought in this country.

Urging that steps be taken to open large foreign markets for meat products.

Opposing unfair restrictions on foreign meat products.

Contending the practice of buyers on certain markets of buying parts of livestock shipments on condition that the remainder of the shipment is sold at the same price.

Indorsing the Capper bill to provide an agricultural credit system and requesting the different states to establish uniform chattel mortgage laws.

Favoring adoption of a percentage basis for commission charges in selling livestock.

TWO PRISONERS ARE RELEASED
