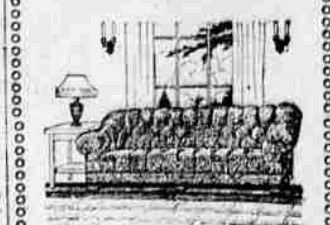

ALASKAN OIL STAMPEDE NEXT

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 3.—On the rugged splinter of land known as the Alaska peninsula, which separates Bering Sea from the warmer waters of the Pacific, an important oil development is going on, which, if successful, it is predicted, will cause a stampede eclipsing that of the Klondike.

W. L. Keyser, veteran Alaskan traveler, said here that two large American oil companies are now drilling on Cold Bay, on the peninsula across from Kodiak Island.

"Up to a short time ago this region was almost uncolonized," he said. "But when I left four townships were already laid out on Portage Bay and one of them, Kanatak, had developed to the extent of a postoffice, stores and other facilities."

Th all district, Mr. Keyser said, is reached by steamers from Seward and Kodiak to Portage Bay. Travel, he said, has developed to such an extent that the fare from Kodiak to Cold Bay is now only \$22.50, whereas his first trip cost him \$300.

The Landy cheese factory at Myrtle Point started operations about a year ago, during which time it has manufactured 135,765 pounds of cheese and paid a 16 per cent dividend to the stockholders.

It is estimated by the federal biological survey that 40,000 predatory animals were destroyed by state and federal hunters during the past year by the use of poison baits and traps.

The Ewauna mill at Klamath Falls began sawing this week with a day shift of 35 men. The mill, one of the largest and most modern in the county, had been closed for some time.
