Family quarrels with her stepfather and that statement, "If I cannot have things like other girls have, there is no use in my living," contained in a note left her girl chum, Sylvia Minton, 1126 Washington street, are given as the reason for the announced act.

SALEM, Feb. 2.—The governor vetoed the Upton bill exempting from the inheritance tax the Bernard Daly estate left for the educating of boys and girls of Lake county.

With four weeks gone by 16 bills have been passed by both houses, twelve of them being signed by Governor Pierce.

In the house 314 bills have been introduced. Forty house bills have been defeated, withdrawn or indefinitely postponed, seven bills have passed both houses, and sixty-six have passed the house undisposed of by the senate.

In the senate 134 bills have been introduced, nine of them having been passed by both houses.

The revision of the banking code providing closer supervision as a greater safeguard to depositors was introduced late yesterday by Senators Robertson and Hare.

One of the most interesting of these occasions was when President Roosevelt visited the Hermitage in 1907.

Mrs. Lawrence will be buried in the Hermitage graveyard beside her husband, whose sleep General Jackson and his wife and other members of his household.

MURDER CASE BAPPLING.
SHANGHAI, Feb. 2.—In the murder of Bernard Goldenberg, prominent figure in the moving picture and theatrical world of the Far East, the authorities at Shanghai are forced to admit they are dealing with one of the most baffling problems in the criminal annals of the port.

Goldenberg, well known in Japan, Hongkong and Manila, was manager of the Viceroy theatre, one of the leading moving picture houses at Shanghai. He occupied an apartment in the theatre building, and was found murdered in his apartment. His shirt was crumpled, evidently by a choke, the police state.

Tax Collector Dexter McIlroy stated today that the tax rolls will be out by February 10-15 but the mailing of the statements will not be completed until early in March. The amount of taxes left delinquent from the past year is very small and proportionally better than at this time last year.

This year the first half of the taxes may be paid from the date of issuance of the statements until April 5th with no penalty and the second half may be paid from April 5th to October 5th, before an interest penalty is imposed.
