CIRCUIT COURT OPENED TODAY

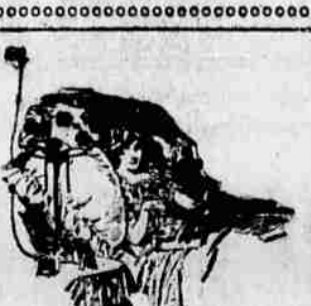

PITTSBURG TRAIL IS BEING BUILT

WALLOWA, Feb. 5.—No snow has fallen in the Snake river canyon this winter, and the grass is six inches high, according to the report of J. H. Mann, one of the local forest rangers, who returned this week from the eastern edge of the county. He also reports that drilling operations are going on across from Pittsburg Landing in Idaho in the hope of finding oil.

The work of building the trail from Pittsburg to Sand Creek is being pushed. Twelve men under Chris Skaar, are engaged in the construction, and have completed a mile and a half of the fifteen miles to be built. The trail is cut along the face of the cliff for about a third of the distance and is located just above the high water line. The expense of the work is taken from the grazing fee, a forest service regulation providing for 10 per cent of such money to be retained in this way. The purpose of the trail is for the administration of the cattle ranches along the river.

HUGE EGG FOUND PROSSER, Wash., Feb. 5.—An egg weighing nearly a half pound was recently exhibited here by Mrs. S. P. Arthur. The egg three inches long and two in diameter was the product of a White Leghorn hen.

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MONUMENT ERECTED

SPANISH FORK, Utah, Feb. 5.—A monument has been erected here by the daughters of the American Revolution and the city of Spanish Fork to the memory of Padre Escalante, daring Spanish priest-explorer, who visited what is now Utah about three quarters of a century before the advent of the Mormons in 1847. His tombstone, dumped on the present site of the city of Spanish Fork about September 23, 1776.

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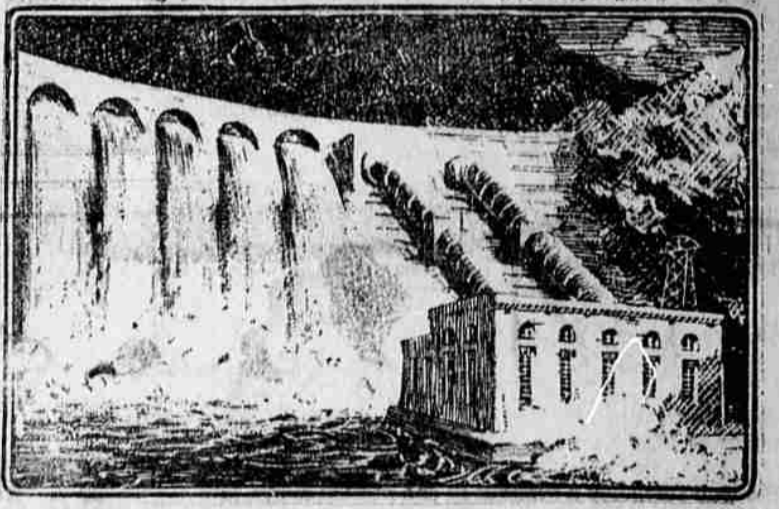
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
