What brought the victory to La Grande more than any one thing was the passing and teamwork of the Blues. Despite the fact that foul by Joseph slowed up the game, the Blues played their fastest ball of the season throughout. In the last half, with the team at full strength, the outcome was never doubtful—La Grande was never in the slightest danger in that period.

On the Wallowa county acreage, Tim H. Coles was high point man with 11 points and Lynch with 10, was high point man for the Blues. Next Saturday the Blues go to Pendleton in an attempt to defeat the stellar team in the sister division. Although the result of the Pendleton-La Grande games have no bearing on whether the team goes to Salem or not, if La Grande wins she would have a clear call to the Eastern Oregon championship as the Blues are clearing up everything in their division. The Blue and White girls also make their first appearance of the season on the Pendleton floor when they take on the Round Bay high girls society, touted as being one of the strongest girl teams in the state.

RED CROSS REPORT FOR FEBRUARY OUT

The report of the work of the Red Cross in La Grande during the past month is now complete and shows that during January 61 civilian families and 84 post-war families were aided by the organization. Three hundred and twenty visits were made. The expenditures for the month for relief purposes was \$256.88 and the reimbursement amounted to \$78.00.

TWO FIRES HIT UPSTATE HARD

CLATSKANIE, Ore., Feb. 5.—The large island cannery owned by the Columbia River Packers' association, an electric generator plant in conjunction and the home of J. A. Pappert were destroyed by fire at Clatskanie, across the Columbia river from Clatskanie, at 5:30 last night. Two homes near the cannery were damaged. Estimates were not given out, but it is believed the loss exceeded \$40,000.

OREGON CITY BLAZE

OREGON CITY, Feb. 5.—The Congregational church, at Eleventh and Main streets, was destroyed by a mysterious fire at 5 o'clock this morning. The loss was estimated at \$21,000, with \$11,000 insurance. Fire Chief Priebe declared that the fire was evidently of incendiary origin. There had been no fire in the furnace for a week, and there was no fire in the study when Rev. Caradoc Morgan, the pastor, left the building about 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon. This is the second church here to be destroyed by a supposedly incendiary fire, the Presbyterian church having been burned last year.
