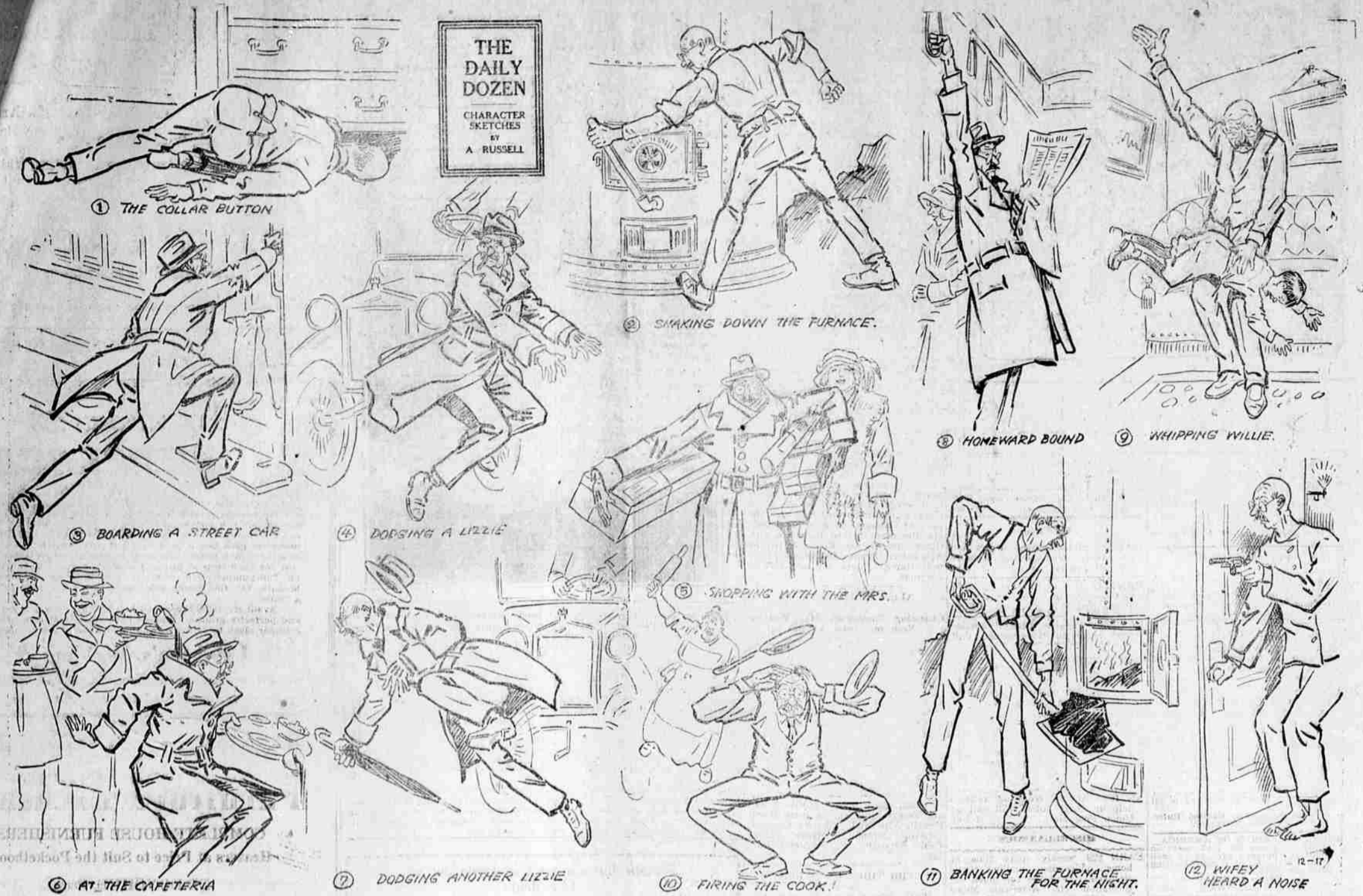

ICE BEING HARVESTED

HAINES, Feb. 8.—The Pacific Fruit Express company is harvesting its big ice crop this week. Seven or eight thousand tons of ice will be cut and stored from the company's ponds at North Powder, where refrigeration cars parked last are cooled during the summer months. The ice now being secured was formed during still cold weather without any mixture of snow and is about 15 inches in thickness and of better quality than has been stored here for several years.

TO TAX MOTOR TRUCKS

HOOD RIVER, Feb. 8.—The city council last night indicated that it will pass at an early date an ordinance providing a tax for motor trucks of Portland bakeries used in delivering bread here daily from the big city bakes shops. The matter was initiated by E. C. Kroll, local baker, who presented the city fathers with an ordinance now in force at Salem, which provides for an annual tax of \$500 per year for each delivery wagon operated in the city by a bakery outside of Marion county.
