SCHOLARSHIPS GIVEN WOMEN

CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—Women who served with the armed forces of the United States during the world war, and who have been honorably discharged from such service, are to benefit from tuition scholarships in various educational institutions of the country, in accordance with the action of the trustees of the Estate of La Verne Noyes, of this city.

At a trustees' meeting just held, allotments have been made whereby thirty such scholarships for nurses who served in the nurse corps of the army or navy of the United States shall be honored as follows: Twenty scholarships at the Teachers' College of Columbia University, New York.

Five scholarships at the Georgia Peabody College for Teachers, Nashville, Tenn.

Five scholarships at the University of California, Berkeley, Calif.

Furthermore, in keeping with the provisions of the will of the late La Verne Noyes that the income from the estate shall be used for educating men who served in our army and navy, or their descendants, the trustees also announce the allotment of
