In presenting the plan for immediate construction, the Freeman in the day in behalf of the bishop and the Chapter made the following announcement: "This cathedral that is proposed to be erected in the capital of the nation, makes an unusual and unique appeal because it is national in character. There is no other city on this continent where such a building can so fully express the high ideals of our nation as Washington. This is more than a diocesan building and its interest is more than local. Here in Washington stands the great building that has to do with the life of the nation, the federal administration, and here it is indispensable that a great cathedral building should incarnate and interpret those things that we hold and believe to be fundamental to the perpetuity of the nation itself."

"Beyond the fact that it is the building of a great religious body, it must stand as the witness of our common faith as a people. In the very best sense it is to be a house of prayer for all people. No building in Great Britain so focuses the affections of the people as Westminster Abbey. This great cathedral is literally the shrine of Great Britain. It is beyond the fact that the national cathedral in Washington ultimately must come to be to America what the Abbey is to the English people. It ought to be the place of sepulture for the great dead of our nation. It ought to be a memorial to the men and women who so unflinchingly gave themselves for God and country. On the artistic side it will be the greatest building of its kind in America and one of the notable buildings of the world. If a nation can be aroused to erect great memorials for its distinguished dead then surely it must be appealed to by the vision of such a vast undertaking as this one, which is to give permanent witness to those high hopes and ideals that constitute the security of the home, the state and the nation itself."

In the erection of the structure, Freeman, Ross and Little, architects, with Dean and Ferguson as consulting architects, will carry out the original designs. The cathedral has been designed by one of the greatest English architects, the late George P. Bodley and his American associate, the late Henry Vaughan. It has been pronounced one of the most beautiful in the world. It will be seen that in its great proportions the cathedral will be larger than Westminster Abbey, for its whole length, outside measurement, will be 500 feet; its width 125 feet. Its great central tower will rise to 240 feet, and its twin front towers will be 132 feet tall. The massive central tower, erected on the great eminence will have an elevation of 644 feet above the city of Washington, making it the most conspicuous and commanding object in the capital.

The apex, already erected, was the gift of the late Mrs. Archibald H. Russell, in memory of her mother, Mrs. Percy R. Tyne. The Bethlehem chapel, beneath the apex, is at present used for services. A considerable portion of the chapel already is in process of construction, largely through the gift of a Washington layman whose name is withheld, and the foundation of the entire structure, also in process of construction will be completed within the coming year. The present value of the property with its endowments and investments funds has been conservatively estimated more than four million dollars of which the largest single gift was five hundred thousand dollars by the late John A. Keweenaw, one time United States minister to Austria.

Behind the present national movement are to be numbered some of the best known Americans. Among those who are taking an active part are the following members of the Cathedral Chapter: Charles C. Glover, chairman of the board of the Regis National bank at whose home in 1892 a meeting was held which resulted in the charter of the Cathedral Foundation; Henry White, former American ambassador to France; Charles J. Bell, president of the American Security & Trust company; James P. Macle, trustee of the Carnegie Foundation; Theodore C. Thon and Dr. William H. Wilcox, Bishop Perry of Rhode Island, Bishop Rhinelander of Pennsylvania, Bishop Harding of Washington, president of the Chapter; The Very Rev. G. C. P. Brute, dean of the cathedral; Rev. William I. DeVries, the chancellor; Rev. James E. Freeman, rector of the Church of the Epiphany and Dr. William C. Rivers.
