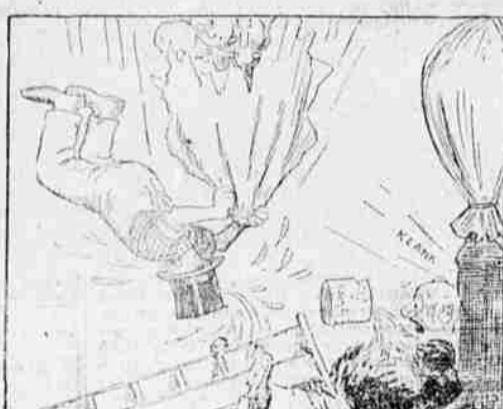
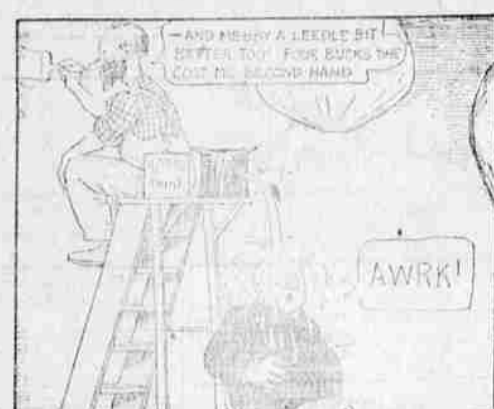

UNION HIGH GYM OPENED

Business Men and Teachers Clash in Hoop Game Friday Eve at Official Opening of Gymnasium.

UNION, Feb. 12.—Friday night witnessed the opening of the new gymnasium which two games were played on the gym floor. The first game was between the teachers of the public schools and the business men of the town. There were only six of the teachers and one of the business men were unable to play, that a couple of checks settled in their places. The line-up was Teachers: Conklin, Connor, Baxter, Ross, Morgan and Miller, the last named being a member of the teacher training class in the high school.
