UNRESTRICTED IMMIGRATION IS OPPOSED

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 15.—With more than a quarter of a million workmen unemployed, the United States does not need unrestricted immigration to augment its labor supply, according to Garland W. Powell, director of the national American commission of the American Legion who spoke at a recent Legion meeting in Louisville.

Mr. Powell stated that his unemployment figures were based on a census conducted by the American Legion commission through association with addressed to all state chambers of commerce and to state officials of the Legion.

"The results of this census directly refute many arguments in favor of lowering the bars against alien immigration this year," said Powell. "There is an organized movement about among certain employing interests to repeat the request for a new act for limiting immigration, on the plea of a scarcity of labor. The American Legion wants to bring the true condition of affairs before the country. We are not alarmists, but we do not feel that the true business interests of the country will be forwarded by bringing in all the cheap foreign labor that Europe can supply. We want to see American industries manned by American labor, at a living wage."

Referring to certain plans for more unskilled labor as "tomorrow," Powell declared he could bring forward statistics to prove that in the coal industry alone, three miners were struggling to make a living on wages not enough to live on.

"The American Legion is pro-American," said Powell. "We are absolutely neutral in economic disputes, because our membership is made up from all sorts of occupations, employers and laborers alike. But we feel it our duty to warn the American people that the population of this country is already one-third foreign by birth or extraction. Unrestricted immigration would inundate this country in five years more. This is a condition we do not desire."

CURIOUS RADIO FACT IS FOUND

A group of radio experts made a very important discovery which means a great deal to every radio fan since it will allow him to receive the broadcasted programs more clearly and over greater distances. The discovery has to do with the acoustic properties of the radio headset. If two violins or other musical instruments are playing in perfect unison, the resulting sound will be clearer and much louder than would be possible if the two instruments were a bit "out of step," "out of tune," or "out of resonance" as the physicists say. It is also possible to gain an understanding of this phenomenon by considering a note in the middle register of a piano. This note is made by a single key striking three wires of exactly the same length and tension.

The result is a strong, clear note since the sound waves emitted by each wire are "in step" or "in tune" with each other and therefore they do not conflict. If they did conflict in tone the resulting musical note would be muddy and untrue at all times. Neither would it travel as far as the single, true tone-wave. The application of this to telephone headsets has made it possible to greatly increase their sensitivity and the clearness of the music or speech they reproduce. In a radio headset each receiver should be carefully matched in tone so that they will both emit vibrations of the same nature. The receivers must be "sounded" together. If the message is to be clearly understood, this is especially important for distance reception. Matched tone headsets have been found to greatly increase the range of radio receiving sets as they produce exactly the same tone at each ear. The human ear is more sensitive to vibrations of sympathetic nature.
