AT SHERRYS
 "A BLIND BARGAIN"
 TODAY AND TOMORROW

A new screen sensation is prom-
 ised to motion picture-goers at the
 Sherry Theatre when the Goldwyn

In "A Blind Bargain," the doctor
 gives financial and medical aid to a
 struggling author who tried to
 hold him up in order to obtain money
 to restore his almost dying moth-
 er to health. In return the au-
 thor agrees to let the doctor ex-
 periment upon him. Having fallen
 in love with a girl, and been war-
 ried of the mental and physical dan-
 gers that threaten him from the
 coming experiment, he tries to buy
 his release from his agreement. He
 is strapped to the operating table by
 the doctor, however, and is saved
 from a horrible fate only by the
 superhuman power that has come to
 one of the doctor's former victims,
 imprisoned in his private dungeon.
 This man overpowers and crushes
 the doctor to death when he enters
 the dungeon to get the monkey
 whose glands were to be trans-
 formed into the author's body.

Aside from Lon Chaney the cast
 includes Jacqueline Logan, former
 "Follies" beauty; Raymond McKee,
 Fontaine La Rue, Virginia True,
 Boardman, Aggie Herring and
 Virginia Madison. A marvelous spec-

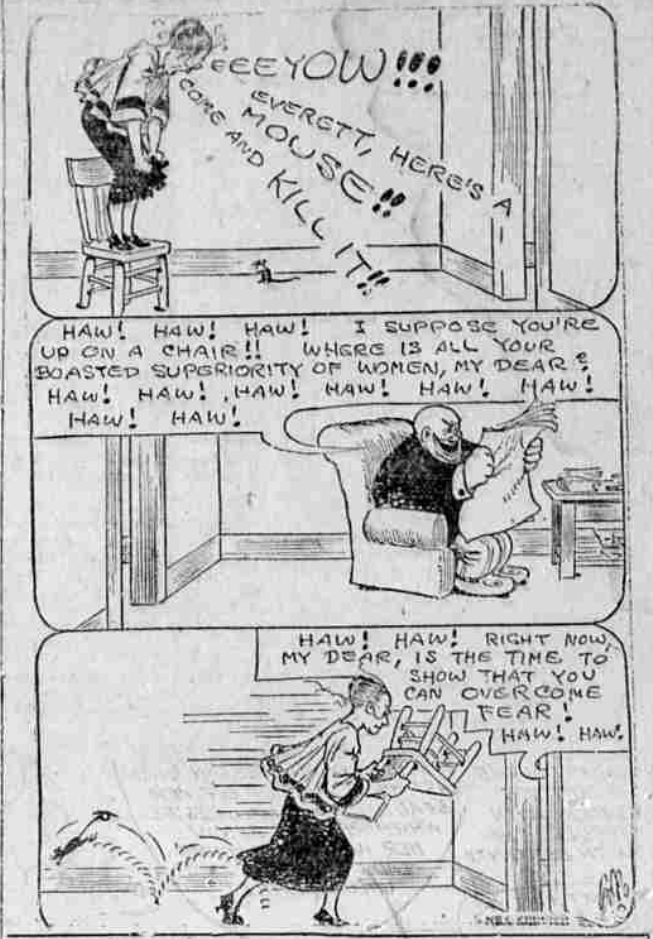
