Portland Man Heads the State Board of Commerce

PORTLAND, Feb. 16.—W. G. Ide, of Portland, a colonization man of wide experience, has been selected to handle the land settlement work of the Oregon State Board of Commerce, it was announced today. Mr. Ide was selected following the decision of the state chamber to organize all sections of the state in need of settlers. In anticipation of the state-wide development program to be inaugurated this year by the Oregon Development Board. Lands available for colonization in various districts of the state will be listed and settlers will be placed on specific tracts of land under the supervision of the state chamber.

Heretofore, the land settlement efforts of the state chamber have been in many new home-seekers, but it has been impossible to check up on the number who have actually settled in Oregon, nor the districts in which they have located. Under the new arrangement, a close contact will be maintained with each settler until he is actually located under conditions suited to his means and requirements.
