

HARDING TELLS CITIZENS OF THEIR DUTIES

 WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—That citizen who regards himself as a model of civic propriety because his present conduct is impeccable, but who does not cooperate with the civil authorities or exert his influence in behalf of the best possible administration of the laws, possibly overrates his usefulness as a citizen. President Harding stated today in continuing his idea of the responsibility of the individual citizen for the proper administration of the laws of the country and his city. The message of the president was addressed to the citizens of the United States through the Rotary International in connection with the eighteenth anniversary of the organization of the first Rotary club at Chicago, February 23, 1905.

The full text of President Harding's message follows:
 "To the members, Rotary International:
 "The individual citizen's responsibility for executive government begins with the election of the executive. This implies the duty of every voter to vote; a duty that many millions of them regularly fail to perform. Before that, it implies the duty to vote intelligently, to make the vote represent a deliberate decision based on the claims of the opposing parties and candidates.
 "Finally, the executive being duly selected, it implies the obligation to give him the support of all good citizens in every effort of administration of the law. That citizen who regards himself as a model of the civic propriety, because his present conduct is impeccable, but who does not cooperate with the civil authorities or exert his influence in behalf of the best possible administration of the law greatly overrates his own usefulness as a citizen. The responsible officers of government, whether it be municipal, state or national, need and are entitled to the full and effective support of all citizens in the enforcement of laws.
 "If the effort of Rotary should be effective in impressing this conception of the citizen's duty, it will have performed a most useful service."

OREGON CITY ROAD SURE

Alaskan Movies To Be Released Soon

 ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Feb. 21.—Alaskan motion pictures with Alaskan themes, made in Alaska in getting camera during the gold stampede of '96-'97, will soon be turned out in the largest north movie studio. The big studio has been completed at Anchorage and is awaiting the arrival of the film material, returned from California.

In Alaskan picture it is proposed to utilize many famous living characters of the "Lawson" days and picturesque Alaskan scenery, including Mount McKinley and the surrounding of the Broad Pass.
 The promoters of this farthest north "Magic City" say that Anchorage is ideal for scenic effects, especially where snow reaches are desired. Practically the whole of December and January are bathed in brilliant sunshine. Within a few hours' ride from the city the cameraman may find immense glaciers in abundance, within a few miles may photograph a flower-strewn valley or obtain the most primitive mountain scenes and scenery to the most modern stamming room it need be.
 Filming pictures will begin in March when the full complement of actors and actresses will arrive to complete the first big picture.
