"Shoot the Chutes" Is Old Stuff in Hawaii—KEALAKEKUA, Island of Hawaii, Feb. 21.—The most popular sport of the natives was enjoyed at this spot years ago by kings and chieftains of Hawaii, according to the tale told by a family of Hawaiian descendants of a family of chieftains to the foreign monarchs to the Hawaiian Islands.

The sport, referred to in histories of Hawaii as "holoa," consisted in sliding down a steep two-mile stretch of limestone, the smooth surface of which was covered with lava stones, to a shallow bay, where the lava stretch, still discernible among the adjoining areas of a-a, on the shore, is approximately ten feet wide and is curved in several places. The stretch is situated in the village of Kealahouka, "Pathway of the Gods."

Once the king or chief reached the bottom of the slide at the sea, it was the duty of the retainers to carry him and his sled back up the steep slope to the starting place for another ride.

"It was a great game for every body but the retainers," the Hawaiian said as he concluded his description of the sport.
