## IRRIGATION BONDS VOTED

BEND, O., Feb. 21.—The Independent municipal improvement district, successor to the Tumalo irrigation district, yesterday voted a \$100,000 bond issue to aid in financing the large development programme now under way. The issue is in addition to \$500,000 previously voted, which is being used for the same purpose. The district also voted to apply for state guarantee of interest on the new issue.

Jay H. Upton, counsel for the district, has been instructed to institute validation proceedings at once in the circuit court.
