GEORGIE HAS FINN COLONY

1920 U. S. Geo. Feb. 26.—The success of a colony of Finlanders established at Gratiot, 16 miles from here about a year ago has resulted in the completion of plans to bring another colony to this section of state. It has been learned. The Finns will be located on a 6,000 acre tract on the Jessup-Jacksonville road. The first colony was started by W. J. Mattson of Gardiner, Mont.

Dairying and farming are the principal occupations of the new settlers and they have built up an industrious and prosperous community. It is stated.

Each of the settlers is assigned to a 200 acre tract of land. They open accounts for food, supplies and other necessities and when the crops are harvested the farmers pool their grain and produce which are sold through a co-operative marketing plan. At the end of the year when accounts are balanced, the Finns, as stockholders, draw dividends. Cotton, sweet potatoes and tobacco are the principal crops handled.

As an example of what can be done it is stated that the Finns have even made a profit from clearing the land of stumps and waste, the sale of the wood to a fuel concern in Brunswick more than paying for the work of clearing the land.
