The consummation of the sale of the timber interests in Coos county to the California and Oregon Lumber company of Brookings, was also announced.

MOUNTAIN TIME FOR IDAHO—WASHINGTON, Mar. 2.—On motion of Representative Smith the House of Representatives Thursday passed with amendment a senate bill placing southern Idaho and extreme eastern Oregon as far as Huntington on mountain time.
