STATE COMMERCE SCRIBES TO MEET

RUGBY, Mar. 2.—Dates for the third annual meeting of Oregon chamber of commerce secretaries will be April 2-4, according to an announcement made here today. The meetings are held each year under the auspices of the school of business administration of the University of Oregon.
