During a recent indoor meet held in the Y gymnasium several athletic records were broken that had been made by local boys; the marks made being as follows: Senior scouts, standing broad jump, Walter Duth, eight feet, one and one-half inch; running broad jump, Fern Kelley, fourteen feet; standing high jump, three feet seven inches; fence vault, Fern Kelley, five feet six inches; Junior scouts, standing high jump, Claire McKennon, three feet seven inches; Grade school boys (from 12 to 15), running broad jump, Arthur Starmer, eleven feet ten inches; standing high jump, La Faun Boy, three feet seven inches; fence vault, Clarence Parry, four feet two inches, and pull up, Earl Ford, 13 times. Last Saturday several more records were broken. Leo McGonigle winning the broad jump with a leap of fifteen feet and two inches, and Merlin Mayger the pull up with 20 times.

Crowds Witness Closing

Crowds witnessed the closing scenes, the adjournment and presence of President Harding, cabinet officers, diplomats and other high officials bringing out hundreds who packed the senate and house galleries.
 The president reached the capital at 11:25 o'clock and was kept busy reading and signing the final avalanche of bills. Before going to the capital, he signed the farm credits and 42 other bills, turned out during the early morning sessions Sunday. In the presidential suite off the senate chamber, before the noon light expired, 55 more bills received executive approval.
 The last bill to become law was the "better butter" measure, changing butter fat standards. An important measure placed on the statute books at the last moment was the one providing for return to enemy alien ownership of all seized property worth \$10,000 or more, after an almost 60-6000 or less.
