BLUE FIVE WINS FROM BAKER 35-29

on teams stands in the path of Blue and White championship honors. Joseph, last year's champion, yet must be met in a post season game to play off the tie. Following La Grande's win Saturday night, Coach Cecil Snow announced to his proteges that they would play Joseph high some time this week, either at Enterprise or Union. And the winner goes to Salem.

Joseph followers are in favor of the site for the game as being Enterprise. La Grande supporters are equally in favor of the selection of the Union gym, which, according to Professor Roy Conklin, can be made regulation size. At present the floor is 67 by 49 feet, short of regulation size by three and one half feet, respectively. And Professor Conklin also promised that the floor could be put in first class shape and that the balconies in the Union gym would hold a crowd of at least 300, not counting the lower floor. Neither La Grande or Joseph has played at Union on the new floor, and in the opinion of the writer and a host of other fans, that would be the ideal site for the game.

Baker Hard To Take.
But returning to Saturday's game, which opened the pathway to the Joseph-La Grande post season game, Baker high school, nearly three score strong, accompanied Coach "Dad" King and his husky team to La Grande nearly sure of a victory after winning from the Blues in Baker 12 to 10. But a different story resulted.

La Grande scored first when Lynch converted a foul but Baker promptly lifted the lead one point with a field basket. Lynch dropped in two more conversions, Metcalf added a basket from the floor and with the score La Grande 3, Baker 2, a period of one point advances began. During the remainder of the half both teams climbed the greatest part of the way by converting fouls—the half ending La Grande 14, Baker 11. Baker converted 3 fouls and La Grande converted 6. Other scoring was made by Metcalf, Price and Lynch, each netting the team a field basket.

Baker Rallies.
In the last half Baker returned to the game determined to win or bust and drew blood first. Lynch scored a basket and two fouls and with the score 18-14, Baker again got going. Two field baskets tied the score

when La Grande again went into the lead soon to be tied by Baker. Another foul, and with the score standing, La Grande 21, Baker 20, Smith was taken out on account of personal fouls, Funk coming in. Hummelt had been pulled early in the first half and the lineup, with Lynch and Price at forwards, Metcalf at center and Funk and Garrity at guards, left the team lacking in weight but still with a terrific amount of fight. More foul conversions sent the score to La Grande 24, Baker 22, when Price dropped in a field basket giving La Grande a four point lead. It was of short duration however for while Lynch converted one foul, Baker converted one and got two baskets leaving the score 27 all when the final whistle blew.

Going Fast In End.
Rarely had the La Grande team played so fast a game of basketball as they did in the extra period. With glimpses of a possible trip to Salem, they rallied and in the last five minutes, hit a pace that left Baker in the cold. Price scored two field baskets and Lynch scored one after Baker had broken a two point lead that Funk had given La Grande by a classy shot. Then the last whistle blew and pandemonium reigned.

La Grande Works Classy.
Facing one of the strongest teams that they have met this year, and with two of their regulars out of the lineup, the Blues showed that they still had the old stuff and the never say die spirit. Not a man fell down. Metcalf went good, Lynch played one of the best games of his year, Price and Funk lifted themselves into the starring column, Garrity's work was there, and while they were in, Smith and Hummelt played nothing else but basketball.

On the Baker team Stoddard was the individual star with the other four men backing him in fine shape. La Grande's teamwork outclassed Baker and their basket shooting was more accurate. But what brought pleasure to the fans more than anything else was the return of the Blues fighting spirit.

Girls Swamp Imbler.
In the opening game the La Grande

girls, who although having lost two games to the Pendleton girls, came back with a display of playing that gave the Imbler girls little chance to even shoot at the basket. Every member of the sextette played almost faultless ball and the game was won from the first five minutes on. La Grande took an early lead with a straight string of eight points before Imbler scored one point. The Blues again hit a fast pace and added 12 more before Imbler raised their score to 2. The half ended 26 to 2 for La Grande.

In the last half Imbler scored but once, on a converted foul, the score then standing 35 to 3. Before the referee, Earl Reynolds, brought the game to an end with the blast of the time-keeper's whistle, 22 more points went the girls' score to 27. Although starting the season with practically new material, Miss Jocelyn has built up the team until, in the last game, they appeared nearly as strong as Pendleton, an old team that is rated as being one of the fastest in the state of Oregon. Next year the girls should have a whirlwind aggregation from the first.
