witness for the state in the trial of Dr. J. J. P. Bray, Medford examiner and chiropractor, J. P. Hittson, automobile dealer and former chief of police of Medford, Howard A. Hill and 16 other defendants as "John Does," testified as he lay on a cot facing the jury and told of alleged events of that night.

By his testimony he positively identified Dr. Bray as a member of the mob which he said engaged in the hanging affair, partially identified Hittson as a member, and said he was unable to identify Hill as a third party member.

He testified that the kidnapers wore long black robes and black hoods with eye holes in them. He also testified that N. B. Bunnell of Medford was a member of the mob. Punnell was not indicted.

**Neck "Stretched"**  
 He testified that he saw and recognized Bray as the latter was being over him administering first aid after he had temporarily swooned away because of the mistreatment at the hands of the mob. He declared that Bray's mask was off and that his face was close to him. He told of the details of the hanging after he had been kidnaped and taken in an automobile about 30 miles.

The party disembarked under an overcast, attached a long rope around his neck and threw the other end over a limb, he told the jury. Then he was questioned about his relations with two young women of Medford. He denied doing any wrong, whereupon, he said, the robot cried that he was a liar and "bring on the ropes." Hale said he was asked to tell something he hadn't done and that when he refused "they stretched my neck." He attempted to ease the strain on him, he said, by standing on his tiptoes.
