## UNION TO GET 60 PHEASANTS

Twenty dozen, or 240 China pheasants is the quota to be released in Union county this year to insure the perpetuation of one of the most successful type of game-birds in Eastern Oregon, announced the secretary of the Wing, Fish and Pilefoot club, a county organization of sportsmen, today. One shipment has already been received and liberated in La Grande, consisting of 60 birds, and a similar shipment is now on its way to Union. A third and fourth shipment will be sent to Union county soon, one to be liberated at Imbler and one at Elgin. The plan, at present, of the club and the State Game and Fish commission, is to keep the Grande Ronde valley well stocked with game-birds, not only pheasants but other types as well.  
With this idea in view, Al Andrews, Wing, Fish and Pilefoot club secretary, is requesting that sportsmen throughout the valley, if they know of the whereabouts of a covey of Hungarian partridges, notify either him or L. A. Wright of Union. The Hungarian pheasant was first introduced in Union county four years ago and since that time several other shipments have been received. Reports, in a general way, have been coming in occasionally that the birds are thriving, but the club is desirous of ascertaining the location of the coveys and details as to their success, before another shipment is received. If sufficient proof is received that the partridge thrives in this section steps will very likely be taken to increase the number of birds liberated in the future.
