CATTLE RAISERS SUSTAIN LOSSES

PENDLETON, Mar. 7.—Cattlemen of Umatilla county and eastern Oregon generally are losing money every day, and if relief does not come at once in the form of either increased prices or decreased costs, the continuation of the cattle business is an impossibility, according to H. P. Whitman, chairman of the livestock committee of the Umatilla county farm bureau and himself a cattlemen.

A survey of cattle conditions in Umatilla county, which covers 7000 cattle belonging to 54 men, has been made with the co-operation of Professor E. La Potter, of the Oregon agricultural college, and at the suggestion and with the aid of County Agent Fred Bennion, and the actual figures show a loss of \$1.22 per head on cattle for 1922, not counting interest on land or equipment, or labor of the owner or manager.

FIRE DAMAGES ROOMING HOUSE

The most serious fire that La Grande has experienced during the past three weeks occurred last evening when an exploding oil stove ignited hanging in the room occupied by Bertha Walsinger, manager of the Waverly Apartments, on O Avenue, and before put out by the fire department, caused approximately \$750 to \$1000 loss. The greater part of the damage was caused by the fire, although water and smoke damaged the house to some extent.

The fire alarm was sounded at 10:30 o'clock, and although the recall came at 10:45 o'clock, the fire, until stopped had spread rapidly, totally gutting one room, that occupied by Miss Walsinger, and partially damaging an adjoining room. A quantity of clothing and similar articles were destroyed and it is expected that it will be necessary to repaint and repair the entire apartment house. No one was injured.
