

AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION TO GET MILLIONS

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Mar. 8.—There was allocated for co-operative agricultural extension work throughout the country in 1923-24, approximately \$18,821,000, of which the Federal government contributed \$5,880,000 under the provisions of the Smith-Lever Act. Congress by direct appropriation to the Department of Agriculture made available \$1,028,000 in addition for farmers' co-operative demonstration work and \$45,000 for extension work making a total from Federal sources of \$6,953,000. The remaining \$11,868,000 was derived from sources within the states, including \$5,241,000 appropriated by state legislatures and funds under control of the state agricultural colleges, \$5,627,000 provided by the different counties, and \$1,000,000 from other sources, mostly local.

ADVANCES GIVEN TO CARD FACULTY

STANFORD, CALIF., Mar. 8.—Twenty-two members of the Stanford faculty were given promotions in rank with accompanying salary increases and without change in academic title at a recent meeting of the Stanford board of trustees, according to an announcement from President Wilbur's office. The promotions were made possible by the rapid progress of the Stanford endowment campaign which has already placed funds at the disposal of the university. Nearly half of the recent advances were made in the medical faculty. These have been brought about by the success of the "Medical Million" endowment campaign in San Francisco and Bay cities in behalf of the Stanford medical school. The medical faculty did not share in the benefits of the Oregon endowment campaign inasmuch as the general education board offered a \$200,000 endowment toward a million dollar fund to be raised among alumni and students for the purpose of salary increases outside of professional departments. The promotions just made are as follows:
From associate professor to professor: Dr. Frank E. Hensell, surgery; Dr. John E. Cowan, surgery; Dr. Chas. H. Danforth, anatomy; Dr. Ernest C. Dickson, medicine; Dr. Leonard W. Ely, orthopedics; Dr. Harold K. Fisher, pediatrics; Percy A. Martin, European history; William H. Adams, law; and Edgar E. Robinson, American history. Other promotions were from assistant professor to associate professor and from instructor to assistant professor.

FEDERAL MOVIE IS A THRILLER

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8.—"Mollie of Pine Grove Farm," the Government's latest motion picture thriller, is about ready to start on a tour of regions in many of which motion pictures have never been shown. Designed for use as a preliminary weapon in combating the cattle fever tick in the South, the film presents a well-plotted human interest story showing the misguided opposition often encountered by government and state agents in freeing the South of ticks, and the good results that follow eradication of the pest.
It will go out in a motion picture truck of the Department of Agriculture's bureau of animal industry for nighty stand in the tick-infested territory and also will be circulated through the film distribution system through which the department has been reaching the public.
The picture was made by Government experts in and near Washington, North Carolina, and shows many stirring scenes culminating in the oxymoron of a cattle tick dipping vat and the capture of the dynamite by Mollie Sawyer, the heroine of the story. Better times come to the community with the eradication of the tick, prosperous farms are shown, powdered cattle are grown and sold and the new "Mollie Sawyer Community House" is named for the heroine of Pine Grove farm.

Some One Swiped King Tutankhamen's Purse

LUXOR, Egypt, Feb. 1. (By Mail).—Of all the fine things found in the outer room of the disturbed resting place of King Tutankhamen, the finest, from the antiquarian standpoint, is the "Ushabti," a small image of the king himself. That, at least, is the opinion of Lord Carnarvon.

The "Ushabti," or "Answerer," showing the defunct monarch in the guise of Osiris, was customarily placed in royal tombs with an inscription stating that the image was prepared to do any work imposed upon it. Then the tomb was sealed so tightly nobody could get to the Ushabti, and request it to do something.
Back in what Tutankhamen may, in his language, have referred to as the good old days of yore, the Pharaoh, when he died, was accompanied to the underworld by a slave, sacrificed during the royal funeral ceremonies. In more "modern" times the slave was allowed to live, and the "Ushabti" was substituted for him. This was done in the case of Tutankhamen.

CAR TO BE CONFISCATED
OREGON CITY, Or., Mar. 8.—A return on the seizure of the automobile of E. L. Grace of Eugene, who was arrested in Oregon City Tuesday night, when four gallons of moonshine were found in his car, will be made to Circuit Judge Campbell tomorrow. District Attorney Stupp announced today. This will be the first step in confiscation proceedings under the new state prohibition law, which authorizes the sale of bootleggers' cars.
District Attorney Stupp learned today from the district attorney at Eugene that the automobile was purchased by Grace from the E. C. Simmons company of Eugene and that \$320 is still due on the sales contract.

LUMBER DEMAND IS ABOVE NORMAL

Demand for lumber during February remained above normal, while production suffered seriously from inclement weather in practically all important producing sections, says the American Lumberman, Chicago. The combined lumbermen of orders, production and shipments of the eight leading softwood manufacturing associations during the week ended February 17, showed bookings at 8 per cent above normal; output at 35 per cent below normal and shipments at 12 per cent below the same standard. Orders for southern pine during the week mentioned totaled 25 per cent above production, and those for Douglas fir were 38 per cent above output. These figures give conclusive proof of gradual depletion of stocks that already has reached a really serious point, and of the heavily overbooked condition of the mills. This situation is making it very difficult for buyers to place orders, mills as a rule not being willing to commit themselves any further ahead and finding it necessary to decline a big per centage of the business offered them.

There would undoubtedly be many buyers in distress need of lumber at this time were it not for the fact that wholesalers are putting into transit large quantities of material which they bought some time ago, before the lumber shortage had reached its present acuteness and prices had mounted to their present levels. These transit cars are moving into consumption steadily, and there does not appear to be any oversupply that might cause a weakening of the market. Mill prices mean-

while continue to strengthen practically throughout the list, and the upward movement is not nearly so rapid now as during January, due to the manufacturers' efforts to stabilize the market. It is difficult to foresee what levels will be attained if needs continue as heavy as they have been and the mills are not soon able to increase their production materially. At present, snows, rains and floods are creating great difficulties for loggers and manufacturers on the west coast and throughout the South and Southwest.

Demand for hardwoods remains very strong, and prices continue to show a pronounced upward tendency. Dry stocks are almost impossible to find, and the movement of green lumber shows constant growth. Many northern manufacturers of both hardwoods and softwoods, who customarily do their logging in the winter, are contemplating putting in summer camps this year in view of the prospective enormous lumber consumption and the demand for logs from paper and pulp manufacturers and other industrial concerns.
