## POULTRY VALUE AT LOWER MARK

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, Mar. 9.—More chickens were raised and more eggs produced last year than in 1921 but their farm value was not so great. The combined farm value of chickens raised and eggs produced in 1922 is estimated at \$554,207,000, by the United States department of agriculture. The value in 1921 was \$606,226,000.

About 542,000,000 chickens were raised on farms in 1922, with a farm value of \$354,159,000, as compared with 510,000,000 chickens raised in 1921 valued at \$422,255,000. Egg production totaled 1,262,315,000 dozen eggs of a value of \$606,000,000 as compared with 1,237,400,000 dozen eggs with a value of \$538,547,000 in 1921.

Of the chicken eggs produced in 1922, large quantities were consumed in industries in the manufacture of other than food products, and about 112,000,000 dozen were used to produce chickens, the department says.

The average farm price of chickens raised in 1922 was 65¢ per fowl, compared with 71 cents in 1921, and with 83¢ cents in 1920. The average farm price of chicken eggs was 25.2 cents a dozen in 1922, compared with 29.2 cents per dozen in 1921 and with 44.4 cents in 1920.

It is estimated that there were 412,000,000 chickens on farms January 1, 1922, a time of year when the number of chicks is low. There were 236,000,000 chickens on farms January 1, 1921, and on January 1, 1920, there were 350,000,000 according to census figures.

**MILLS HAVE GOOD MONTH**  
WHEATFIELD, Ore., Mar. 9.—Although the shortest month in the year, February was one of the best months experienced by the many lumbermen in Tillamook county for several years.

While many mills and camps in other parts of the Pacific northwest were closed on account of heavy, practically every mill and camp in this county operated every day during the month.

Lumber shipments were heavy, as 222 carloads of lumber were shipped by the three largest mills—the Whitney company at Garibaldi, the Deighton Mill company at Brighton and the Wheeler Lumber company at Wheeler. Several smaller sawmills and a number of shingle mills sent shipments which totaled better than 149 carloads. More than 1500 men are employed in the camps and mills and the combined payroll each month, aggregates \$165,000. No labor shortage has been noticed.

**CAMPS TO BE COMBINED**  
MEDFORD, Ore., Mar. 9.—Medford will have a unique and well equipped city automobile camp when the contract signed by the city council for combining the city camp with the Merrick privately-owned automobile camp adjoining the big auditorium. **GROSBEEK ON MIGRATION**  
TROUTSVILLE, Ore., Mar. 9.—Flocks of the beautiful western evening grosbeak have appeared here. The males are olive yellow and reddish, while the female is yellowish in color. They have large bills, evidently for the cracking of large seeds and the cones of the pine. The birds have arrived much earlier than last year.

Students of bird lore want to know whence the grosbeaks come, and note that ornithological writers are non-committal on the subject. It is surmised that their true homes and nesting places are in the mountains of southern Oregon, the Coast range and the Cascades.

**FEED THE BIRDS IN WINTER.**

CHICAGO, Mar. 9.—An appeal to the people of the Northern part of the United States to feed the birds during the winter months that they may protect the crops in the summer time is made by the Illinois Humane society in a statement issued here today.

The appeal says "Every person ought to do something to protect these little creatures from suffering and starvation so that they may survive the rigors of winter. Let's spare a bit of our larders. Almost anything from the table will do. It is both a humane and profitable undertaking."
