NEW CREAMERY TO OPEN DOORS

E. E. Anderson Has Management of Commercial Creamery; To Open Under Name of The Union Creamery Company.

La Grande business circles have been supplemented with the coming of E. E. Anderson, formerly associated with the Henington Produce company in Butte, Montana, for four years, and with the Mutual Creamery of Seattle for two years, who has taken over the management of the Union Creamery company, of La Grande, located at 1112 Jefferson avenue, formerly the Commercial Creamery.
 The new concern is installing a complete and modern butter plant that will be equal to any plant in this territory. It will be capable of turning out 1,000 pounds of butter at one time and 150,000 pounds per month. A refrigerating system is also being installed. The basement store rooms, equipped with four and six inch solid cork walls, are the latest thing in that line and one of the store rooms is capable of handling two carloads of butter.
 A special brand of butter will be featured by the company when they begin operations, which will probably be next week. They are also introducing Medco-Maid Evaporated milk in this section.
