

RUSS EXPORTS UNCHECKED IN NEEDY PERIOD

MOSCOW, Feb. 5. (By Mail.)—Russian ships loaded with grain for western Europe may steam out of Soviet harbors at the same time that American ships, likewise laden with grain for the Russian famine sufferers, steam into Russian ports, unless present plans of the Soviet government are changed.

The Russian authorities largely interested at this time in the building up of future agricultural and industrial possibilities, anticipate that they will be able to export even more food stuffs than they are asking such foreign organizations as the American Relief Administration to import. They explain the apparent inconsistencies of this plan by the statement that the outgoing food stuffs are private property, and that to be considered in their new policy of permitting private initiative, they cannot continue this food see far as needs, even though they have to request that food be sent into Russia to prevent thousands of deaths from starvation.

The grain for export, they say, is the property of various co-operative societies accumulated by them from individual peasants who, in some fruitful regions, had a surplus above their own needs. This surplus was considered by the societies to be exchanged abroad for implements and other articles which the peasants must have, but cannot secure in Russia.

Asked why the government does not help its own people when there is sufficient food in the country to feed the entire population, instead of continuing to plead for American and other foreign aid, one official said that if the surplus of the peasant were taken away from him this year, he probably would not raise any more grain than he absolutely needed for himself next year.

The government had to abandon the policy of requisitioning supplies from the peasants two years ago, and to encourage them to plant more grain than they needed for their own use," this official said. "If we started again to requisition grain from the peasants or co-operatives, we not only would undo all of the work of two years, but would be directly refuting our new policy of free trade."

At a recent meeting of The State Plan Commission, the official statistician declared that Russia should be able to export from last year's crop about 100,000,000 pounds, or roughly 50 million bushels of grain. The time is now ripe, this expert said, for Russia to endeavor to regain the European bread market. He doubted, however, the ability of the co-operatives to handle such a large quantity of grain. A small amount of Russian rice and wheat is already at the ports, but up to the present time little of it has actually been placed aboard ship for export.

The Scandinavian countries are expected to be the principal buyers of Russian grain this year.

WORLD'S BUTTER RECORD BROKEN

VANCOUVER, B. C., Mar. 10.—Acania Sops May Echo, a five-year-old Holstein, owned by the Dominion Experimental Farm at Agassiz, B. C., has established a world's record in butter production, according to the announcement of W. H. Hicks, superintendent of the farm.

This queen of dairy animals, Mr. Hicks said, has in 305 days produced 10,884 pounds of milk, averaged more than 4 1/2 per cent. butterfat, and yielding 484 pounds of butter.

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AIR GLIDER MEET IS NEXT OCTOBER

CHICAGO, Mar. 10.—A competition for gliders is being arranged to be held in St. Louis next October at the time of the Pulitzer Trophy race, according to L. J. O'Malley, secretary of the Aviation club of Chicago.

A number of machines are under construction in Chicago, Mr. O'Malley states, and the entry list of men operating motorless gliding machines will be large. "A machine built from the plans of the 'Vampy' glider, which made the world's record at the German meet last August, is now in the United States and will compete," said Mr. O'Malley.

Though a good aeroplane pilot will readily learn to fly a glider, no one without previous training in powered flight can expect to successfully manipulate a glider. This work requires a sense of "feel" and the pre-knowledge of detecting the "sinking wave" in the air current. In short, motorless flight instruction has commenced, which bespeaks a new era in aeronautics. This, coupled with the proven fact that gliders, with their large wing area, are immeasurably less liable to accident than heavy power machines, speaks volumes for safety in flight.

WINTER GRAINS IN GOOD SHAPE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10.—Winter grains have come through the winter months in generally good condition, according to a report by the department of agriculture. Although slight damage may have resulted from the recent cold weather, particularly in the Midwest without snow cover, the benefit of the accompanying rains and snows was said to have more than offset this possibility.

Wheat movement from the farms was reported to be nearly normal in the latter part of February, while farm reserves of corn in some of the heavy livestock feeding districts were said to be low, with the movement of corn from the farms in other areas slowed down by lack of cars.

While farm work has slowed down as the result of recent storms and cold weather, it was said to be further advanced than usual in large sections, due to the generally mild weather preceding.

Livestock feeding conditions were reported generally good as a result of the mild winter with pastures now beginning to furnish feed in numerous areas and ranges in generally good shape.

Owing to the heavy movement of farm labor toward industrial centers, the department said a "marked" shortage of such labor was probable in many localities when the spring rush of farm work begins.
