FANS AWAITING FRIDAY FIGHT

Shannon-Bairie Tep Round Battle Expected to Draw Biggest Crowd in Local Boxing History.

Eddie Shannon, legitimate 122-pound champion of the Pacific coast, had a record in fighting that is more evidence of his popularity and worth in the ring. Scheduled to meet this evening in the main event of a 24-round boxing card, the Portland fighter is expected to draw the largest crowd of spectators that a fight card has ever attracted in this section.

Shannon has fought both as a lightweight and a featherweight and has fought in practically every section of the United States, very few defeats being credited to him. Recently meeting Joe Gorman in Portland, Shannon was given a newspaper decision over his opponent, and Portlanders were unanimous in acclaiming the scrap as nothing else but a bad-kept A. No. 1 mill.

Bairie is expected to give Shannon one of the hardest battles he ever took on. The Utah fighter, although as seasoned as is the champ, is able to take a lot, and still give a lot in return. His punches, when they land, carry weight behind them and he is willing to mix it with anyone. Shannon also has the reputation of being a fighter who doesn't stall when in the ring and relies to a great extent upon a left punch that appears from nowhere with a quickness that makes the eye blink.

Tickets for the match will go on sale tomorrow at the Imperial Billiard Parlor and the Home Plate.

500 GET JOBS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Mar. 12.—The Community Placement Bureau, a semi-philanthropic institution founded and directed by San Francisco business men for the benefit of helping the unemployed, will begin its fourth year here this week after becoming, in the opinion of its founders, a successful institution.

During its operations for the first three years, the bureau has placed more than 5,000 men and women in positions at a nominal fee, according to Mrs. Margaret O'Connor, manager. For the first two years, Mrs. O'Connor says, the bureau operated at a heavy loss, the burden being borne by its founders. The last year, however, the bureau operated at a profit, having placed 890 men and 1,190 women in positions.
