Wealty of Wallawa, Pomona; Mrs. M. E. Plesner of Lostine, steward; Mrs. H. C. Hargrave of Enterprise, lady assistant steward. The executive committee are: C. E. Glenn of Lostine; T. G. Johnson of Wallawa, and Fred Hemelwright of Joseph. Giles Plam, county commissioner of Wallawa county, was appointed chairman of the committee on legislation. Tables were arranged in the gymnasium of the high school and it was estimated that close to 200 assisted in disposing of the banquet furnished by the Wallawa Grange. The after dinner program started off with an address of welcome by Mayor Marvin of Wallawa. Prof. H. T. Bailey, agriculture teacher of Wallawa, spoke of the cooperation work of the grange and in extending scientific agriculture. A number of excellent readings and musical numbers were given. McKenna in planning for next year's demonstration. Mr. Long, of O. A. C., was in Imbler Tuesday and lectured to the fruitgrowers. His talk was very interesting and encouraging. A mass meeting was held in the Legion hall last Monday night to consider the proposition of installing a water system in the town. After discussion pro and con a vote was taken to ascertain the sentiment of the people. There were sixteen votes in favor of the proposition and 11 opposed to it. Dan Westenskow has purchased two acres of land, 230 acres situated two miles east of Imbler, also the 40 acres adjoining it owned by Mrs. J. A. Johnson. Mrs. Johnson and family will take up residence in the city. "Star Bright" Presented. The M. L. A. dramatic company of La Grande presented "Star Bright" at Imbler Wednesday night to a large audience. The performance was late in starting due to the fact that one of the cars carrying the players got stuck in the mud and had considerable difficulty in getting out. Many of the people of the community have been heard to say that in their opinion the performance was the best of its kind that has been staged in Imbler for quite a while. The senior class of the high school sold home made candy and pop corn before and after the show. The proceeds will be applied as part payment on their class dues which they are to pay on Monday night. A basketball game was played on Monday night between the Giants and the high school boys. It was agreed that the losing team should put up an oyster supper for all. At the end of the game the score was 17-17, so they played five minutes longer with the result that the high school team won. The supper was served the following night.

### GRAZING FEE IS OPPOSED

Resolutions protesting against any increase of rates for grazing fees to cattle and sheep on the national forest lands were adopted today by the livestock men who met for forest of flocks, Prof. E. L. Potter, head of the live stock department of O. A. C., and Fred Bennett, county agent, in a conference, says the East Oregonian. A hearing will be held in Salt Lake City March 19, by the forest service when the point of view of the livestock men may be expressed. Several representatives from Umatilla county are expected to be sent to the hearing. Figures were disclosed which, it is declared, make it evident that the forest service should not endeavor to make the forests self-sustaining by grazing fees because, they declare, the protection of timber is the one job of the service and sheep and cattle should not have to pay for the protection of timber. Not all timber land is grazing land, they say, and their contention is that the livestock interests should not be called on to pay for costs of all forest land when they use only a part of it for grazing purposes.
