HOW IS THE WATER SITUATION?

By telephone, telegraph, mail and verbally, this question is asked of us hundreds of times each day. It is not surprising because thousands in the territory we serve are vitally interested in it.

The answer is, in a general way, it grows more serious each day, BUT, each day brings relief that much nearer and from past experience we have good reason to hope that the worst will be over within the next ten or twelve days.

The relief will come gradually, however, and it will probably be thirty days at least before we will be back to normal operation. Water will come slowly at first. The plants located at lower altitudes will naturally be the first ones to feel the effect of the breaking up of the winter.

We have four water power plants. No one or two of them can pull the whole load. In fact, at times, even with normal water conditions, it takes all of them together with the steam plant to take care of the demand upon us.

In the meantime we are sparing no expense or effort to get through with the least inconvenience to everyone. Although the situation has been brought about by no fault of ours, money, men and materials have been thrown into the breach in the effort to render service.
