 BAKER, May 15.—W. W. Webber, an aged pioneer of Eastern Oregon, passed away early this morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Effie Lane, 2455 Seventh and Campbell streets.

Mr. Webber was 88 years of age, born at Plymouth, Ohio, in 1835. He came to Baker county more than 50 years ago, and engaged in mining. He was the first to discover gold in High Valley, and made his home there for many years. He served as postmaster at High Valley for 18 years, and came to Baker about 12 years ago to make his home.

The deceased is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Lane, in whose home he died.

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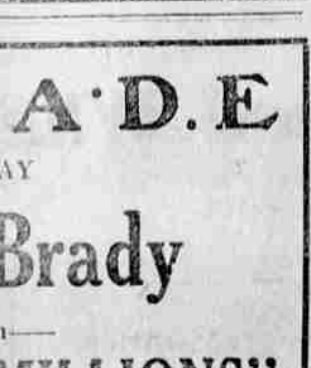
