

CAPITALISM ATTACKED BY LABOR PAPER

LONDON, Eng., Mar. 15.—"Labor should do itself the justice of ceasing to be negative, anti-capitalist, making only of its shares," writes Ramsey MacDonald, leader of the Labor Opposition in the House of Commons in the February issue of the Socialist Review. His article is called "The Outlook for Trade Unionism."

"Every counsellor who advises in the contrary to the spirit of social co-operation is misleading it," continued Mr. MacDonald. "The building up of an organization devised exclusively to fight capitalism is an error. The fight against capitalism has to be carried on by applying a better spirit than that of capitalism to social and industrial problems and difficulties."

After stating that political and moral weapons alone can undermine the walls of capitalism, Mr. MacDonald adds:

"Organized labor, trade union executives, parliamentary parties, should each in their own way and in respect to their own trades and jobs make the conspiracy of capitalism against the community not always against the labor party—clear. This has to be accomplished by a persistent explanation of the work of capitalism, its watered stocks, its flotation expenses, its useless payments, its methods of keeping up prices, and such like."

In conclusion, Mr. MacDonald says: "Capitalism is decaying owing to its moral bankruptcy. It is at war with social production, with common well-being, and with the spiritual love of liberty. If the labor struggle is conducted in the same spirit as the capitalists have shown, and on a class basis, the decisive battle will be fought with economic weapons alone and labor will gain no great victory; but as soon as labor frees its mind so as to come under the influence of the spirit of its historic role to create a social economic organization that will secure liberty and make a single minded pursuit of commonwealth interests practicable, it will equip itself with weapons and hold a position which will make its final victory certain."

LARGER JAIL PROPOSED

VANCOUVER, Wash., Mar. 15.—A request for the enlargement of the Clarke county jail was laid before by Sheriff Thompson. The congestion of prisoners in the jail has become so great, he told the board, that a larger jail is imperative.

The number of prisoners this week reached 46. Since that time several have been released, but the number is still 42, which is far beyond the normal number in the past. The prisoners include ten women.

Most of the prisoners are not likely to get out soon, so the congestion will get worse instead of decreasing, Sheriff Thompson said.

Ralph Huron, Commander of La Grande Post No. 43, American Legion: "The most valuable organization in existence today to disabled ex-service men is the American Red Cross. The American Legion is doing its best for service men, and we are proud of our record of things accomplished. But in the matter of preparing the enormous amount of evidence required by law to connect disability with service, without the Red Cross the task for the Legion would be hopeless. No post of the Legion would be able to find officers who would have time to do this work. Further, trained workers are required. Workers who know what evidence is required by existing law, and who know by experience how to spend money available for this work to the best advantage. I find that the number of cases now being handled by the local chapter of the Red Cross for disabled service men, who are having difficulty in proving that their disability is a result of their service, is appalling. I believe that all members of the Legion and all service men should give to this campaign."
